Sunshine Careers

As some returned Peace Corps Volunteers know... it's better to be outside where the sun shines and plants grow! Corny? Yes. But definitely true for a lot of RPCVs. How many times have you declared your absolute determination to avoid a desk job as though it were a swim around a tank full of starving piranhas? Well, have no fear, rip off those cubicle shackles, for the outdoor employment article is here!

Where Do I Begin?

First, pick what field or fields you are interested in and those which you just refuse to consider. Beekeeping is not for everyone, but neither is owning a fish hatchery. Which appeals to you? Believe it or not, there are opportunities in nearly every field. There is a greater abundance of employment in the agriculture and natural resources fields, but positions in outdoor teaching, health, communications, and even law are available.

Think of your ideal job in your ideal field and then just imagine it outside. More aptly put, pick out your position (lawyer, writer, public relations) and then think of working for the National Park Services, Conservation Corps, or National Wildlife Federation. They may seem like organizations that only employ environmental majors or agricultural extensionists, but they all have legal issues, public relations departments, and publications.

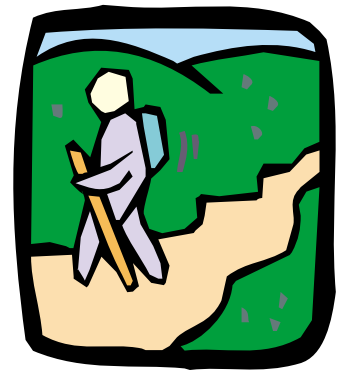
The second task to complete is

deciding whether you are looking for seasonal employment to get by these lean times by having a little fun or if you are making a long-term career choice. There are vast opportunities in both areas, but obviously the requirements and the pay are different. Seasonal employment can lead to more permanent employment, but hopefully the opposite will never be true for you.

The downside to picking up seasonal employment is that there are fairly strict deadlines for many of the government agencies, which will have passed by the time this article comes out (oops). For positions with past deadlines, keep them in mind for next year or even later in the season, because the turnover rate can be high.

Instead of working for the government, you may consider working for private and charitable camps, resorts, or lodges, or becoming a tour guide of just about anything under the sun. You will be trading job security for a more flexible application deadline; but hey, it's seasonal employment—it's meant to be temporary.

There is a vast sea of opportunity just waiting for you to take the plunge. The *best* way to get the job you want (after narrowing your scope) is to research: Read books, search the Internet, and execute all of the usual means. But you don't have to do it all alone, Dorothy. I can't lead you directly to the Emerald City, but I can put you on the yellow brick road with a few suggestions.



Steps To Take

First, check out the book *Sunshine Jobs: Career Opportunities Working Outdoors* by Tom Siniestra (it's about \$15). It has 50 chapters on every career from bush pilot to hydrologist and from marine patrol to video show producer. Have you ever thought about becoming a lookout tower spotter, a year-round firefighter, or an outdoor writer? How about an interpretive center director (What is an interpretive center director, you may ask? Two hints: national parks and teaching). There is even a chapter on becoming a Peace Corps Volunteer—which you don't need, but it is still fun to read. Many of the jobs sound made up or too good to be true, but they really are just the pairing of a common skill or degree with a lot of ingenuity. Sure, you can teach, but can you teach kayaking to the blind or inspire urbanites to see the beauty and the dangers of the wild? (An interpretive center director can.)

Each chapter targets a career

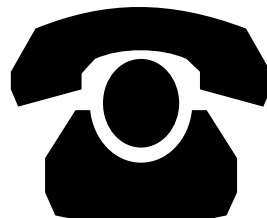

and is divided into two sections. The first section is the good, bad, and the ugly of every job. It talks about the best part of the job and the worst case scenarios as well as general requirements and the pay range. The second section is made up of profiles of two professionals currently in the business. They give their take on the job along with exactly what the pay is for them and how they got it. This section ends with a list of three to five references.

Next, try surfing the "Net." I put in the key words "employment" and "outdoors" and came up with about 10 matches which are listed in the Internet guide below. The most useful to me was the site "Great Places: Jobs in National Parks, Monuments, Recreation and Wilderness Areas" at: <www.coolworks.com/showme/natprk.htm>. It is a must see! It shows National Park openings in several states, state parks, ranches ski resorts, and volunteerism. This site also lists 45,000 jobs, has a "have skills will travel" section, as well as recruiters' schedules and job fair dates.

The last resource is the government—all of the government. First, check out the National Park



Service, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, and Department of Agriculture. Don't forget, however, other agencies like the U.S. Coast Guard, Department of Health and Human Services, Department of Energy, and the Department of Defense. Exciting jobs can be found in the most unlikely places. A little digging is required to find certain offices. For instance, did you know that the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration is under the Department of Commerce? Or that Environment, Safety and Occupational Health is under the Department of Defense? Luckily, information on these agencies and many more can be found in the appendices of Returned Volunteer Services' *Environmental Careers* and *Careers in Agriculture* manuals. 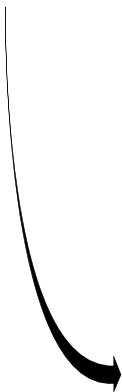
