Considering a Career in Education? Job Trends and **Opportunities for RPCVs** By: Tamara Webb, RVS Program Specialist



he March 2007 RPCV Career Events kicked off on Tuesday, March 6th with three panel discussions focused on careers in education. Sally Caldwell, Director of Peace Corps' Coverdell World Wise Schools and Acting Director of the Office of Domestic Programs, facilitated a morning session that reviewed the occupational outlook of the K-12 education industry. Anne Baker, Vice President of the National Peace Corps Association (NPCA), and Martha Abbott, Director of Education for the American Council on the Teaching of Foreign Languages (ACTFL), also served on the opening panel. The session that followed was comprised of educators serving in a variety of different roles in schools and school districts, foundations, and other non-profit organizations. To close the day, attendees participated in a discussion about various teaching training programs and factors to consider in choosing a career in teaching.

LANGUAGE EDUCATION

During the opening session, Martha Abbott of ACTFL highlighted that many new language education programs are beginning to emerge. While Spanish is still the most commonly taught language in K-12 schools, a significant number of schools and school districts have started and expanded foreign language programs in Arabic, Chinese, Hindi, Farsi and other languages classified as "critical need." 1 Martha noted that fewer French and German language courses are being taught. In addition, there is an increased trend in requiring teachers working with non-English speaking immigrant student populations. As a result of these trends, a variety of jobs will be increasingly in demand. School superintendents and principals that can effectively staff the programs and monitor progress will also be needed.

Through specialized language training and testing, the majority of returned Peace Corps Volunteers has demonstrated the ability to acquire new languages, which gives RP-CVs special advantages in the competition for teaching jobs. Moreover, in 2005, one or more of the "critical need" languages was spoken in 15% of the countries currently served by the Peace Corps.²

It was also noted that foreign language teachers should be considered "hard to fill" positions, alongside positions in special education, and advanced math and sciences (e.g., calculus, physics, chemistry).

GLOBAL EDUCATION

In addition to the special attention given to second language proficiency, the rise of programs focused on global issues and geographic literacy also suggest new employment opportunities for RPCVs. International education programs are supported by schools, nonprofit and corporate foundations, and by formal linkages between public and private institutions. The diversity of sponsors and types of sponsorships create interesting programs and job opportunities for those committed to ongoing educational improvement.

In the state of Washington, for instance, an after-school global leadership program that teaches Chinese and Arabic is offered at Seattle Public Schools; but, a non-profit organization actually provides the services. Junior Achievement



(JA) Worldwide is a not-for-profit organization sponsored by corporate and individual contributors. JA programs target K-12 students and focus on the key content areas of entrepreneurship, work readiness, and financial literacy, in the context of a global economy.

Anne Baker, NPCA Director of Global Education, commented that the wealth of programs, organizations, and partnerships focused on what is loosely termed, "global education" is so evident that the NPCA has considered offering a portal to such programs instead of creating a host of new ones. One notable example of this wealth is the Peace Corps Coverdell World Wise Schools program (CWWS). CWWS provides cross-cultural classroom materials, literature, videos, lessons, ideas, and services designed to enrich K-12 students. Since its inception in 1989, CWWS has helped more than 3 million U.S. students communicate directly with Peace Corps Volunteers all over the world.

Bringing a global perspective into the classroom must begin with helping educators develop that perspective for themselves. Returned Peace Corps Volunteers have met that requirement and carry a multitude of complementary qualifications. RPCVs are well-positioned to administer and advise many of the various global education programs. The challenge to RPCVs is to effectively communicate and advertise related qualifications on résumés and during other aspects of the job search.

NON-TEACHING OPPORTUNITIES FOR K-12 EDUCATORS

During the second panel discussion, Dr. Ramona Edelin, Executive Director of the DC Association of Chartered Public Schools, commented on a wide variety of occupations, including entrepreneurial opportunities, available in K-12 education. Teaching was simply one of the most common. While three of the six speakers had K-12 teaching experience, Dr. Edelin along with Barry Lofton, another member of the panel, did not. Barry serves as the Director for Corporate and Community Relations for Friendship Public Charter School, which has six campuses, in Washington, D.C. He is a Certified Fund Raising Manager with a background in development and finance. Grant-writers, evaluation and assessment personnel, and college counselors, and are just a few of the types of pressing jobs needed to manage strong school programs.

Ramona encouraged RPCVs to explore the idea of starting a charter school. Charter schools, she contended, offer the flexibility to truly enhance the student learning experience. The creativity, dedication, and international experience nurtured through Peace Corps service are all skills that are needed in K-12 education today.

Panelists Josh Edelman and Michael Cordell both have past experience as school principals, both currently direct academic programs guiding multiple schools, and both have been integral to new charter school development. Their comments, nonetheless, addressed many aspects of K-12 teaching, administration, and advocacy. It was noted that the demand for educators without classroom experience was reinforced throughout the conversations. In one example, Josh discussed the variety of jobs being filled to open a second urban public boarding school for underserved students in grades 7-12. Boarding schools, though not unique in the charge, need employees that understand how to create and utilize collaborative networks of families, faculty, staff, and community members. Returned Peace Corps Volunteers, with their skills in resourcing communities and projects, as well as their involvement in capacity building activities, should definitely be prepared to discuss and emphasize their collaboration skills in the job search.

Peripheral to trends in global education (see above), the panel also suggested that there was an increasing need for information technology specialists and computer technicians to support digital instruction methods and gateways.

K-12 TEACHER TRAINING

A third panel addressed paths to teaching. Most especially for those RPCVs considering a teaching career without specific classroom experience, the panel strongly suggested that interested individuals ask themselves some key questions. Some of the questions to ask when considering the profession are: Do I simply like children, or do I also enjoy the thrill associated with academic instruction? Am I willing to work long hours? Am I willing to stand or be mobile for 6-8 hours? Honest answers to these questions are a key starting point for those considering the teaching profession.

The panel agreed that all paths, both traditional and non, follow the same basic sequence of qualifiers. Coursework precedes practicum hours, which ultimately leads to licensure (licensure requirements vary by state, so please research the state department of education websites for qualifications as well as for types and numbers of necessary licensure exams). In general, program lengths are for approximately two years. Non-traditional programs may offer abbreviated lengths, but will terminate in a conditional license for a period of time before full licensure can be achieved. The panel noted that many programs will accept and apply Peace Corps service by counting it against coursework. Programs less often apply Peace Corps service towards practicum hours.

When considering different programs, questions to ask are: What level of mentoring is available (for instance, am I assigned a personal advisor that is easily and readily accessible)? What kinds of practicums are available? Are there formal school partnerships in place? What is the profile of the teacher training program students? What type of job placement assistance is available? What is the hourly commitment? When are classes offered? Is distance learning available? What financial support is offered? At what point in the program are students allowed to teach full-time in the classroom?

Other considerations include identifying a type of program that best fits your transitional circumstance. For example, some programs are formal graduate school programs (e.g., Fellows/USA). Others cater to mid-career professionals without any academic training in education (the New Teacher Project would be an example of this). A third class of programs are those designed for relatively recent graduates of bachelor degree programs. Many RPCVs fall into this category, of which the Teach for America program would be an example. Finally, for those seeking a path towards educational management, there are programs designed for aspiring school principals and educational administrators (e.g.,

the New Teacher Project and the Broad Academy).

Transitional circumstance necessarily includes financial considerations, so be sure to ask questions regarding some type of financial remuneration. Many programs, particularly those at the graduate level, will offer RPCVs either tuition support or some type of stipend. While some of the support will be well-advertised and apparent, also look to the unobvious. For example, loan forgiveness is possible through some specific school districts, and obviously abbreviated certification programs get a teacher trainee to the end point much sooner, costing new teachers less money in the long run.

WHAT DOES ALL OF THIS MEAN TO THE RPCV?

A key point that was expressed in a variety of ways throughout the day was that RP-CVs bring the ability to inject new thinking into the realm of education and learning. Through skills nurtured through Peace Corps service, such as effective collaboration and language proficiency, RPCVs are capable of engaging young people in ways that encourage students to become further engaged in school experiences. The mere matriculation through Peace Corps offers an educator perspective that is critically needed in this global day and age. Consequently, there is overwhelming support for RPCVs interested in transitioning to careers in education. Professional training, specialized job opportunities, and diverse work environments are available and can make the RPCV enter into the field of education confident, secure, and ready to make a difference. Kudos!
