Summer Adventures Abroad

Now that you are home from the Peace Corps, how are you going to spend your summer? If you have not already made plans, consider one of the following:

- sleeping in traditional *yurts* on the edge of the Gobi desert;
- planting organic coffee seedlings and trees for habitat restoration in Costa Rica;
- renovating houses and building public parks in the Dominican Republic; or
- improving local water supply systems in Tanzania.

Before jumping to conclusions, let me assure you that this is not an article about returning for another run as a Peace Corps Volunteer, despite the striking similarities to your life as a Volunteer. Instead, the list above describes dynamic summer employment opportunities that returned Peace Corps Volunteers (RPCVs) are uniquely qualified for.

Summer leadership positions working with such organizations as Putney Student Travel, Visions Service Adventures, and the Experiment in International Living give RPCVs an opportunity to lead groups of American high school students to foreign lands where they will engage in purposeful service work and cross-cultural learning. This temporary seasonal employment could help you in the transition between Peace Corps service and a full-time, nine-to-five job in the United States.


Returning Overseas

Every summer, there is a great demand for highly skilled and specialized people to take on the task of leading American teenagers abroad for language learning and community service.

By traveling and living day-today with students, you will serve as a mentor, leader, and counselor. "Staffers wear many hats," explains Joanne Pinaire, director of Visions Service Adventures, based in Newport, Pa. "They are technicians, group leaders, role-models, and friends."

Sharing in community service work, intercultural learning, and recreational activities allows you to encourage new attitudes and awareness in America's youth, many of whom are traveling abroad for the first time. "There is nothing that leaders don't do, from the logistical matters to the harder part of being an inspirational leader for the students," says Tim Weed, the executive director of Excel Programs at Putney Student Travel in Putney, Vt.

As a trip leader, you also facilitate the students' learning experience, provide support, and encourage the personal growth that comes with their experience abroad. You are working with students to broaden their global understanding through a combination of travel abroad and service-learning. "Leaders serve as the prime facilitator and catalyst of personal development, cross-cultural skills, and the inner voyage of the program participants," ex-



plains Spencer Moser (RPCV Benin, 1991-94), outreach coordinator and leadership supervisor with the Experiment in International Living in Brattleboro, Vt.

Utilizing Your Peace Corps Skills

These organizations generally demand a number of qualifications from their trip leaders. Namely, you must have skills working with young people, in-country experience, leadership capabilities, language competency, and an interest in intercultural and experiential learning. In addition, emotional maturity, enthusiasm for service, flexibility, and a sense of humor are crucial. Most leaders have at least a bachelor's degree, and many possess additional specialized skills.

RPCVs already boast many of the required skills for these summer leadership positions. For instance, the in-country experience, language fluency, community service knowhow, and technical expertise gained in the Peace Corps transfers easily into such positions.

As a group leader, you are also able to utilize and share the cross-cultural skills that you gained in the Peace Corps. "RPCVs can empathize with program participants because of the cross-cultural sensitivity and awareness they had to develop as Volunteers," explains

Moser. "RPCVs can serve as role-models in this, having dealt with similar situations."

Professional Gains

In addition to the monetary compensation (all of your travel expenses are generally covered, usually accompanied by a stipend), there are many professional advantages to taking on such a position.

Professionally, leadership in these service-learning programs abroad enhances your skills in management, activity coordination, and budget oversight. Generally, as a trip leader, you also serve as an incountry liaison between program administrators and the travelers. "It's an opportunity to sharpen your teeth professionally," says Pinaire.

As Weed of Putney Student Travel explains, "Group leaders gain a number of professional skills. For one, the responsibility of a group leader is enormous, having to deal with a large budget, safety, and security. Also, leaders gain specific skills in field leadership and experiential education, but the broader leadership skills acquired can be applied to any job. It is a good jumping-off point for developing professional leadership skills."

Making the Transition

Whether you can return to your Peace Corps country of service or employ the language and technical skills you gained from the Peace Corps in another country, these programs are ideal ways to ease into the professional world once your Peace Corps service is over.

Moser led four groups—two to Ghana and two to Kenya—with the Experiment in International Living during the summers between graduate study following his Peace Corps service. "As a group leader, I was able to combine my interest and desire to be in West Africa with my educational and professional interests in international education," he explains.

Besides the professional transition, there is also an element of personal readjustment that is facilitated by this opportunity abroad. "After Peace Corps Volunteers undergo the personal experience of change and growth that comes along with Peace Corps service, it is a healthy psychological step to share this experience with others," says Weed.

The third goal of the Peace Corps urges RPCVs to strengthen Americans' understanding about the world and its peoples, and leading high school abroad is an ideal way to accomplish this. "RPCVs serving as group leaders take the third goal of the Peace Corps back overseas and then return home with it again, this time as a driving force to help young peoples' understanding of the world," explains Moser.

In an experience beyond simply touring or sightseeing, you can guide teens in their discoveries of similarities and differences between themselves and others around the world. It is an opportunity to "bring the world back home" by sharing a little of what you learned in the Peace Corps.
