Start Early: The Secret to Selecting the Right Graduate Program

For RPCVs considering graduate school, it is not too early to begin thinking about the application process for spring and fall of 2003. Whether you're still overseas or recently returned, you will have a considerable advantage over other applicants and avoid the stress of procrastination if you start your research now.

Preparing your materials well in advance gives you plenty of time to proofread and rewrite your statements of purpose and to review checklists. You'll also have an advantage in programs that accept candidates or allocate merit awards on a first-come, first-serve basis. Typical submission deadlines usually fall six months before you actually plan to begin classes.

Soul Search and Research

The first step in selecting a graduate program is choosing a field of study. This may require some soul searching. Ask yourself these important questions: Why do I want to go to graduate school? What would be my ideal job upon graduation? What kind of degree programs would be most impressive to my ideal employer? These questions may not be as easy to answer as you think.

After answering these questions, develop some necessary criteria for institutions that you would attend. Consider location and cost of living, program size, reputation, tuition, internship opportunities, career placement services, and faculty interests. Also, contact professionals in your field to find out which graduate schools they

feel are reputable.

Next, list some universities that offer programs in your subject area. Peterson's Annual Guides to Graduate Study (Princeton, NJ, Peterson's Guides) is a six-volume comprehensive reference tool for gathering preliminary information about graduate schools. Don't forget to consider Peace Corps Fellows/USA programs. Fellows/USA works with more than 30 universities that offer financial assistance to RPCVs for graduate school in a variety of subject areas including business, community and economic development, environmental studies, the sciences, healthcare, education, and more, In return, RPCVs hold internships in highneed U.S. communities. I was glad that there was an opportunity to still 'get credit' for my Peace Corps service after the fact and apply it immediately toward graduate study and hands-on community service stateside," said RPCV Skye Sieber (Cameroon, 1996-98), a Peace Corps Fellow at the University of Oregon. "It also gave me great confidence to know that my Peace Corps experience looked desirable to a graduate program."

Information Online

For other universities, call or request information online from their graduate admissions departments. In most cases, the information you will need to know about a program will be found on its Web site. This includes applications. This is especially helpful for Volunteers who are still overseas. If you are in the United States, it may be helpful to also request a physical application packet even if you choose to apply online.

Before filling out applications, however, carefully review the requirements for the universities. If you meet the requirements at many schools, limit your applications to five since the time and expense associated with each application can become large. Each application costs approximately \$55, you'll have to write at least one statement of purpose for each program, and each reference will have to complete five recommendation forms. It is common to include one "sure-thing" and one "long-shot" among your choices of universities.

Next, schedule interviews if they are required. Tour campuses and arrange to sit-in on classes. Identify professors within the programs who share your interests and who could possibly serve as a mentor for you throughout your studies. By talking to current students, you often discover interesting tidbits about the program that you wouldn't hear from admissions departments.

Prepare for Entrance Exams

When you have an idea of where you plan to apply, find out if graduate entrance exams are required. These include the GRE, LSAT, MCAT, GMAT, or the Miller Analogies Test (MAT). Most schools require you to take at least one of these especially if you plan to apply for financial aid. The GRE costs between \$105-\$150 for the general and subject tests, depending on if you are taking them in the United States or abroad. Keep in mind that you must register for these exams two months before the test date. Exams dates are usually offered every few months, but make sure you arrange to take the exams far in advance of your application due dates. To save time and money, be ready to list the universities to which you are applying on the exam, so that you can have your scores sent directly to the institutions. Check <www.gre.org>, <www.lsat.org>, <www.aamc.org>, <www.gmat.org>, or <www.tpcweb.com/mat> for more information.

Most importantly, give yourself plenty of time to prepare for the exams. Purchase study guides or sign-up for study courses. Take mock exams so that you will become familiar with the test formats and learn how to pace yourself. You will not be able to earn a good score by cramming the night before. Some of these exams are offered only on computers. Take advantage of the practice test on the free CD Rom that GRE will send upon registration so that you may get used to the electronic testing method.

Request Transcripts

You will also need to arrange to have your undergraduate and other degree transcripts sent to each university. Contact the registrar's office at all of the universities you have attended and have the documents sent either to you or directly to the graduate admissions offices. Most universities offer this service online. You may also want to request an extra copy for yourself to be reminded of your undergraduate GPA and the courses that you took. Be prepared to spend up to \$5 for each transcript that you request, although some universities may not charge.

Submit Recommendations

Select individuals to write recommendations for you who will discuss your attributes honestly and positively. Make sure that they know you well and are familiar with your previous academic or professional work. At least one recommendation should be from a former professor and one should be from someone

who knows your professional history. If you have been out of school for 10 years or more, it is usually acceptable to submit solely professional recommendations. Recommendations from your Peace Corps country director or other staff are also beneficial.

Send recommendation forms and self-addressed, stamped envelopes to each reference. (Sometimes envelopes pre-addressed to the universities are included in your application packets.) You may even send recent samples of your work, a current résumé, and your Peace Corps Description of Service statement (DOS). Remind your references that many universities request that they initial the seals to ensure confidentiality after they have completed their forms and placed them in the proper envelopes. Have the materials sent directly to the graduate admissions offices or back to you. Allow at least a few weeks for this process before you follow-up with your references to confirm that the completed recommendations have been mailed. Don't forget to send thank-you notes.

Complete Applications

Your applications may either be typed or completed online—and this is the easy part. The more challenging step is creating your statements of purpose. These statements are one of the most important parts of your applications because they give the admissions committees insight into your motivation and commitment, your experience, writing ability, and unique qualities.

Essays should be written in an organized and concise manner that address each point in the essay topics. Highlight relevant educational and professional experience, including your work in the Peace Corps. Explain how your experiences have helped you to mature and will help you to excel within the specific graduate program. As RPCVs, you possess not only technical and language abilities, but special skills of resourcefulness, flexibility, and cultural and global awareness that will add to any campus or classroom environment. In addition, be clear about how completing the graduate program will help you to achieve your career and personal goals.

"We're open to a variety of styles, but the most powerful statements of purpose are wellwritten, have a more professional tone, and the applicant is not trying to be overly humorous," said Thomas Anderson, Peace Corps Fellows/ USA Coordinator at Western Illinois University.

It may help to outline points you'd like to discuss in your essays before you begin writing. You may need to revise multiple times because you rarely produce your best work in the first draft. Additionally, pay attention to length requirements. After you have completed and double-checked your application forms and statements of purpose, review the checklists that are usually

provided with your application packets. Make sure that you have included all of the necessary materials, including writing samples, language aptitude scores, DOS statement, and application fees. Photocopy all of these documents before mailing them in case they are misplaced. Contact the universities if you don't receive confirmation receipts within a few weeks.

Apply for Financial Aid

At this point you will be sighing in relief, but unfortunately, the application process isn't complete yet. Even though you indicated on your applications that you'd like to be considered for departmental financial aid, you should fill out the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) forms anyway at <www.fafsa.ed.gov>. If you wait for a response from universities before you apply for federal aid, it may be too late to arrange assistance for your first semester. Also, you may qualify for grants offered through

sources outside the universities. Contact campus financial aid offices to review all options.

Decide on a Program

Don't expect to hear back from universities until the beginning of April if you are applying for the fall semester. Hopefully, by then, you will have a few quality programs to choose from. Once again, it's time to soul search and reflect upon those important questions you asked yourself before you began the application process. Reconsider the criteria you set for an acceptable graduate program. If possible, visit the schools again and talk to current students and professors. All other factors being equal, when you visit a campus and interact with your potential classmates, your intuition will most likely guide you to the program that is your best match.

He will also discuss the Junior Professional Officer program at the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR), Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO), and World Food Programme (WFP).
