Peace Corps Week: 46th Anniversary, Third Goal, and Readjusting Back "Home"

Peace Corps Week is traditionally viewed as a grand occasion to commemorate the anniversary when President John F. Kennedy signed the Executive Order to establish the Peace Corps on March 1, 1961. Each year around the week of March 1, this milestone is celebrated by the Peace Corps community as they formally promote the Peace Corps by sharing personal stories of their overseas experiences with members of their communities. For this reason, Peace Corps Week is also seen as an ideal time to engage in the third goal—helping promote a better understanding of other peoples on the part of Americans. Formality aside, Peace Corps Week is simply the perfect occasion to relive your Volunteer service memories and to put it into perspective as you readjust to life back home in the United States. This Peace Corps Week, which fell on February 26 through March 4, 2007, was a huge success thanks to more than 3,900 [registered RPCVs](#) and other members of the Peace Corps family across the nation.

To commemorate the agency's 46th anniversary, the New York regional office and local RPCVs

kicked off Peace Corps Week by attending The Today Show on Monday, February 26. The group braved the cold weather and snow to show their support of the Peace Corps, standing outside for more than two hours! Another group of RPCVs attended a taping of Good Morning America on Thursday March 1, meeting with host Chris Cuomo. The show included live music and the attending Peace Corps group (and logo) was well-represented.

Peace Corps Week was also well represented during the Third Annual Culture Day at Western New Mexico University - an event sponsored by the Peace Corps Fellows/USA Program. Eighteen returned Peace Corps Volunteers fulfilled their third goal commitment as they shared their joys of time in service and displayed traditional items and artifacts from respective countries of service.

Using a quilt made by her 95 year old great aunt, with a centerpiece hand stitched by a Namibian friend who died of AIDS, Eve Morgana Wallace, Namibia RPCV (2002-2005), shared her stories about her Peace Corps service with her town of Ajo,

Arizona, and encouraged other returned Volunteers in attendance to participate in Peace Corps Week. Morgana also displayed this amazing quilt at a local quilt show and where it was "the highlight of the show."

Mary Pengelley, RPCV Jamaica 83-87, had the wonderful opportunity to invite her mentee Sara Zuckerman to kick off Peace Corps Week at her Girl Scout Group meeting on February 23.¹ Sara served in Samoa from 2004 to 2006 and brought a power point slide show, along with music, while wearing a traditional Samoan dress. She spoke for more than an hour to a group of 25 girls ages 11-17, who thoroughly enjoyed the presentation. Many great questions were asked throughout the presentation, including what type of government do they have, what types of jobs do women do, and what is their religion? Many "what is that...?" questions - while pointing to remarkable scenes and pictures - were asked, along with a memorable "Ewww - they eat the whole pig?" At the end, the

The presentation made her feel good to share some of her experiences with the girls. It was also great for Mary to see Sara's enthusiasm and remember some of her own experiences from 25 years ago. She remarked, "I hope more recently RPCV's have the opportunity to share their experiences while their memories are fresh."

These anecdotes are but a few great examples of how RPCVs like you are making a difference in their communities by sharing their invaluable Peace Corps experience. As you make the transition home, don't forget to tell your story. It will help you make sense of your Peace Corps experience by putting it into perspective. That perspective can help you identify your competitive advantage when seeking a new job or admittance into graduate school.²

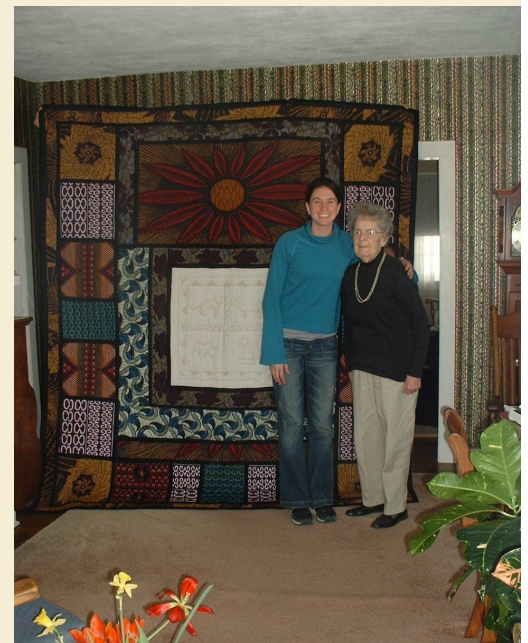

On Friday, April 6, RPCVs discovered the array of employment possibilities within the Department of Transportation (DOT) during an Employer Information Session with Juli Huynh, DOT Corporate Recruitment Manager. Juli primarily focused on the Career Residency Program, a program for which the DOT is actively recruiting talented and motivated individuals interested in pursuing careers in public service. The Career Residency Program is a two-year training program that provides an opportunity to be trained in mission-critical areas while receiving federal government pay and benefits, including flexible work schedules and teleworking.

Some of the many opportunities available within the DOT include IT, Public Policy, Human Resources, Business, and even Public Health. Although a Master's degree is helpful, it is not necessary with a combina-

tion of education (B.A. or B.S.) and professional experience, such as two years serving as a Peace Corps Volunteer.

DOT seeks to hire RPCVs to carry out its vision of providing safer, simpler, smarter transportation solutions. "Opportunities are available at the Department for RPCVs to channel their energy and passion for public service to make a real difference that impacts our people, economy, safety, and environment," Juli says about hiring RPCVs.
