By Hand: Finding a Career in Crafts

They leave the lights on all night at Penland School of Crafts in the mountains of North Carolina. They light up the huge three stories of Loom House, the pottery workshop, the forge, and glassblowing sheds. The lights are left burning because students work late on their crafts, long after sunset, and sometimes—when a kiln is being opened or the forge is operating—into the daylight itself.

Regardless of what hour one approaches the School of Crafts, coming up from Spruce Pine, through the town of Penland itself—now only a post office, a zip code, and railway depotcoming up another few miles, following the curves through forests of North Carolina pines, one can always see the school, bright in the distance. It's pinned into a corner, at the very end of a long sweeping valley and flush against a place called Arthur's Knob. At night the glow of flames from the forges, the glass shed, and the kilns seems to set the base of the knob on fire.

During the day the setting is not so startling—though it's in view of the long blue ridge of the Black Mountain Range and, closer to home, the smooth green and symmetrical Baileys Peak—as it is tranquil. Here, one thinks, is an isolated corner safe from the abuses of mechanization, the rush of business realities. Within minutes, strangers pick up the easy cadence of the place, the relaxed and friendly atmosphere, and the warmth.

Penland School of Crafts

"It began by chance," said Lucy Morgan, who founded Penland in 1929, "and has survived on luck." Morgan, who had been the director of the Episcopal Appalachian School in the village of Penland, wanted to preserve the disappearing traditional crafts of weaving, spinning, and vegetable dyeing.

"Miss Lucy," as she was called at Penland, had studied weaving herself in 1922 at Berea College in Kentucky, and as a young woman had brought back several modern looms for the women of the mountains. A determined person, she traveled the nearby hills on foot and by horseback and taught women, in their homes, the art of weaving. She also brought her products and sold them at North Carolina resorts.

The success of this cottage instruction continued, and a log cabin was built on the grounds of the Appalachian School. The cabin served as the first "school" and social center for the women of the community—and from that small beginning has grown into a school with 41 buildings and 400 acres of land.

In 1962, Miss Lucy retired and Penland selected Bill Brown as its next director. Brown turned Penland from being primarily a school that taught traditional crafts toward being a school interested in advancing the professional skills of students and furthering the development of craft techniques and innovations.

Penland Now

Today, Penland is directed by Jean W. McLaughlin and the school offers one- and two-week classes in the summer and eight-week sessions in the spring and fall. Over 1,200 people come each year to study any of 10 craft media. The fastest-growing courses are in blacksmithing, and the number of older students is increasing as people nearing retirement age and people in corporations who are "dropping out" of the business world look to learn something news.

A Post Peace Corps Career

In the mid-seventies, I coauthored a book titled *By Hand: A Guide to Schools and a Career in Crafts*. It was clear to me then, as it is now, that to make a living as a craft artist is a wonderful way of continuing the Peace Corps experience. The lifestyle that the world of crafts offers is one that, I'm sure, would appeal to many RPCVs.

Who Are We Talking About?

The craft artist is a person who creates his or her own designs and generally makes one-of-a-kind products, usually in a shop or studio. The craft artist is concerned with his or her own satisfaction as an artist, and the work may become non-utilitarian and tend toward sculpture or painting. This person is usually highly educated. He or she has usually attended a college or university that offers

courses in applied arts or a craft school where he or she has studied the principles of design and the history of art, thereby gaining an understanding of the cultural significance of the crafts. In some cases, the craft artist is self-taught.

The Growth of Crafts

While "craft" is an individual artistic endeavor, its development today is an industry. And the growth is most evident in sales of the products, whether it is pottery or weaving. In 1966 the first Northeast Crafts Fair, sponsored by the American Crafts Council, sold the work of 80 craft artists for \$80,000. The same fair in 1974 sold products of 580 craft artists for \$750,000. Last year an American Crafts Council fair in Baltimore generated over \$5 million and had over 700 craft artists showing their wares. The World Crafts Council reports that interest in crafts in the United States is increasing about 20 percent a year.

Summer Craft Schools

For Peace Corps Volunteers returning to the United States who have "discovered" traditional handicrafts in their host country, a summer course is one of the best ways of developing their own skills and wherewithal for making a career in crafts. Penland School in North Carolina, Arrowmont in Tennessee, and Haystack in Maine are some of the oldest and most famous of summer craft schools.

Why Crafts?

People who are asked why they took up a particular craft use sensual words to describe their fondness for the materials involved. Working with such basic elements as clay, fibers, and wood lets a person get "in touch" again with fundamental materials. Toshiko Takaezu, an internationally known artist, puts it this way: "When working with clay, I take pleasure from the process as well as from the finished piece. Every once in a while, I am in tune with the clay, and I hear music, and it's like poetry. Those are moments that make pottery truly beautiful for me."

Crafts Classifications

Ceramics is the most popular of the crafts—it is estimated that 75 percent of all craft artists are potters—but the growth in other crafts is also significant. Today, craft artists are divided into many classifications. There are the folk and traditional craft workers, the contemporary, university-trained craft artists, the designer craft artists, and the hobbyists.

People of all ages are "finding their way with clay." People are learning again to forge, blow glass, and work in fabrics. They are becoming silversmiths, weavers, and joiners.

Getting Skilled

By gaining skills, craft artists are also gaining better control of their lives—learning how to live well and in a different way. For working in crafts evidently makes a person tone down his or her life, and helps reduce the complexities of living. (It's almost like being a PCV again.) However, making a living from crafts is not easily done.

Venturing into the world of crafts as a career is a worthy step, but "finding one's way" means understanding the realities of doing business. According to career coach—artist advocate Caroll Michels, "the biggest mistake craft artists make is a lack of understanding that if one wants to sell their artwork, they are entering into a world of commerce and therefore must treat their career as a business."

Organizations That Help

There are, however, a number of organizations helping craft artists make a living from their work. Most prominent is the nonprofit American Crafts Council, which has over 28,000 members and publishes the magazine *Craft Horizons*. Another extremely useful resource is the *Crafts Report*, founded in 1975. The publication is the first craft business magazine in existence and today sells 50,000 copies a month.

Rose Slivka, former editor in chief of *Craft Horizons*, writes, "The craft artist has demonstrated that there is an economic base . . . her production, limited in order to assure personal control of quality, will not earn her a million dollars, but simply a modest living for herself and her family."

But economics is not why so many people are turning to crafts for a new way of life. Crafts are seen as leisure-time activities, creative hobbies, therapy, and for some, a full-time job. Yet more than any of these, crafts are seen as the way to a lifestyle other than a 9-to-5 job—a lifestyle that today would agree with almost anyone who served in the Peace Corps.
