## Celebrating 4 Decades and 300,000 Years of Service

This year marks the 40th Anniversary of the founding of the Peace Corps. The National Peace Corps Association (NPCA)—the alumni organization for returned Peace Corps Volunteers (RPCVs), Peace Corps staff, and friends—is celebrating. The NPCA, working closely with the Peace Corps and the RPCVs of Washington, D.C., (RPCV/W), is organizing a national conference in Washington, D.C., on September 20-23 to celebrate Peace Corps' 40th Anniversary.

The conference will be held on and around the National Mall, Washington Monument, and the Smithsonian museums. While events are still in the planning stage, lots of work has gone into making this a memorable celebration. Here are just some of the highlights of the NPCA and RPCV/W-sponsored conference:

### Thursday, September 20

The day will start off with an orientation for RPCVs on advocacy issues. Participants will then set off to advocate for issues of concern to RPCVs. Capping off the day will be an opening reception on Capitol Hill where seven RPCV congressmen, the NPCA President Dane Smith, and the city's mayor have been invited to welcome conference participants to Washington, D.C.

The Smithsonian Associates, in conjunction with the NPCA, will sponsor an evening with RPCVs who will talk about the impact of Peace Corps service on their lives and careers. "Hardball" host and RPCV Chris Matthews will moderate an all-RPCV panel. Invited guests include: Associated Press Writer George Gedda; author Karen DeWitt; Congressman Christopher Shays (R-CT); and Senator Christopher Dodd (D-CT).

### Friday, September 21

Alejandro Toledo, a presidential candidate in Peru, has been invited to give the keynote address. Toledo, an economist of Indian ancestry, was taught in his youth by Peace Corps Volunteers. His appearance will set the tone for many testimonials by host country nationals throughout the weekend to the power of Peace Corps Volunteers in affecting social change.

Later in the day, the NPCA will present the Shriver Award for Humanitarian Service and the Loret Miller Ruppe Award for Outstanding Community Service. These awards will go to an individual and an RPCV group, respectively, who continue to make a sustained and distinguished contribution to humanitarian causes in the United States or overseas.

A series of panels will cover topics such as RPCVs in philanthropy, education, business, the arts, health, conservation, and social innovation.

Issues of AIDS funding, financial justice, global warming, foreign assistance, and the future of the Peace Corps will be explored with some who make the policies and those who try to influence them.

That evening, former and current Peace Corps staff members will get together for a reunion reception and silent auction to benefit NPCA programs at the Hotel Washington, while an outdoor stage near the Washington Monument will feature world music. One of the Smithsonian museums will host an RPCV film festival.

Throughout the weekend, numerous ongoing events will take place. Tents on the National Mall will house programs illustrating NPCA programs and the programs of its affiliate groups as well as new Peace Corps initiatives.

In addition, school children and RPCVs will be able to chat with students and current Volunteers overseas via satellite hookup and solar-powered computer. In locations to be determined, RPCV authors will read from their works and a career fair and career workshops will help RPCVs find a job, beef up their resume, and learn about other Volunteer opportunities as well as education programs such as the Peace Corps Fellows/USA programs.
