Find your Career in Development Here at Home By: Katie Yaeger (PCV, Nicaragua, 2002-2004; CCV, Katrina, 2005)



aving spent 27 months-or more-living, working and traveling abroad through your Peace Corps service, you probably returned home with a giant question mark over your head and heart. You wonder, are you ready to be back in the sumptuous USA, with big cars, supercenter stores, and more everyday choices than you ever remembered possible? Admittedly, for many RPCVs it is a painful process of readjustment back home. Although the hot showers and familiar foods temporarily may ameliorate you and make you feel like you are living in the lap of luxury, this feeling soon gives way to a deeper feeling: discontent.

RPCVs are not a pococurante bunch and often desire to continue making a difference in people's lives. Many RPCVs have a deeply rooted desire to work in development-oriented careers. Therefore, they begin the arduous task of job hunting in international development where they end up feeling as though they are one of thousands of people with similar backgrounds...and for good reason. If you take a look at any international development agency, organization, or

foundation, you will find other RPCVs who had the same idea; and there are over 3000 RPCVs returning to the U.S. annually not to mention the thousands of graduates from internationallyfocused university programs. So, with a saturated market seeking work in the field of international development, what other choices are there?

Many RPCVs do not consider the possibility of domestic development work, thereby overlooking the fact that so many aspects of our own society need great improvement. Public health, education, urban and rural development, and agriculture are among many career choices where RPCVs can put to great use their acquired skills and desire to make a difference. Domestic development work benefits from people with the outsider and insider perspective that an RPCV has. Peace Corps Volunteers often learn to understand how complex and difficult development work can be for communities in transition and, as a result, return with a determination and a set of skills that can work in various environments presented to them. Creativity, grant-writing, building relationships with

funders, project development, and working with national, state and local government are just some of the skills that RPCVs bring home, refined and ready for successful use.

Like many other RPCVs, I moved to Washington, DC in search of that perfect Peace Corps-like job in international development. And, like many other RPCVs, I searched ardently and with an unrequited zeal for quite some time. To my surprise, the opportunity that came to me broadened my horizons in a way that I hadn't previously considered: working with domestic sustainable food systems at the Wallace Center at Winrock International. In no time at all, I came to realize the importance of sustainable food systems, and how they affect every person regardless of income level, race, age, region, or passion for the subject.

Interconnected with the areas of environment, land usage, health care, human rights, anti-poverty and hunger, urban sprawl, rural development, politics, industry, nonprofits, foundations, immigration, and people of all ages, the multi-



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farious topic of food systems is truly one that we often don't reflect too deeply upon, but that affects everyone: we all need to eat! Fortunately, there is a growing trend for our society to begin to consider the importance of sustainable food systems, and fading is the day when one had to seek out organic foods, locally grown produce, and fair trade products. Indeed, there is a growing movement with strong undercurrents promoting continued growth. In fact, in some places such as some large metropolises, purchasing your food at a local farmer's market and lauding restaurants that source raw food locally is all the rage! I smile when I think about this and how my work is worthwhile, although I know we still have a long way to go and, as a result, a lot of work left to do.

At the Wallace Center, I have had the opportunity to see how one issue in domestic development work is multifaceted and breaks down into a multitude of discrete opportunities for all types of work. Whether it's farmer's market development and promotion, understanding politics behind the Farm Bill, linking nonprofits with industries, leveraging relationships with various funding organizations and agencies who are committed to sustainable food systems, or researching the effects of immigration on farming and foods, I have come to see how diverse and interesting this field can be! Additionally, as the world becomes even more interconnected through various types of globalization, I realize that the work that I do affects people on all levels and-ultimately -all over the world. And, if I decide to cross back over to international development work, it doesn't look too shabby on my resume that I have worked on a domestic initiative that so strongly correlates. As a result, it builds the resume with rounded experience.

So now you're ready to think about ways to help your local and national community...but where to begin? Remembering that networking means just about everything when looking for a job, start putting out your feelers and let people know what you want. Contact local government officials, who will have a pretty good idea of who is working in the community. The other usual places-such as the library, search engines, community bulletin boards like Craigslist, websites of local communityfocused enterprises and organizations, and general meeting grounds of the community-will reveal new stones to turn over. Set up informational interviews in as many places as you can find and ask anything you would like to know about the organization. This not only allows you the opportunity to meet people, but to also get a greater grasp on what kind of work is being done, and where your efforts are needed most. Having already proven your commitment to service, you may find that once you start talking with individuals and organizations, they are looking for a person just like vou!
