Working as Peace Corps Short-Term Trainers and Consultants

"If you found your Peace Corps service worth two years of your time and effort, you'll also find that sharing your knowledge with new Peace Corps trainees is incredibly rewarding. You know their questions because you had them yourself, and you know the problems they'll face, including some that they haven't even thought about yet. Being in on the beginning of a Peace Corps Volunteer group's two years of service is an opportunity for you to make a major difference in the program. And it gives you the opportunity to make major progress in your own job skills as well: leadership, teamwork, planning, leading sessions, solving problems, counseling people, public speaking, and facilitating groups. Trainings are short, intensive, and challenging. For those who like a challenge, they are a great opportunity!"

Most Peace Corps field offices around the world hire training staff locally. When a post is not able to identify qualified trainers in-country, however, it can contact the Short-Term Assistance Unit in the Peace Corps' Center for Field Assistance and Applied Research. The STAU supports efforts to identify qualified consultants and U.S. personal service contractors by maintaining a database of consultants, technical specialists, and other qualified individuals who can serve the

Getting Started

"Remember those feelings of excitement and nervousness when you walked off the plane in your country of service?" says RPCV Havard Bauer (Kiribati 1990-92). "Remember, when pre-service training was over, how 'ready' you felt to go to site? Become a trainer and relive those glorious and frustrating days from the other side, and experience all of it again. I have been a tech trainer twice and a PST director 11 times, and it is still fun and I'm still learning."

"Some people think training is like a certain quote from Shakespeare," says RPCV Janeen Dorsch (Macedonia 1996-99), " 'a tale told by an idiot, full of sound and fury, signifying nothing.' Those folks don't usually do so well."

Landing a contractor position is very competitive—especially if you are interested in short-term training contracts with the Peace Corps. For example, more than 900 active applicants are listed in the STAU database, yet only 60 requests have come in so far from posts seeking trainers in fiscal year 2003. Here are a few suggestions to keep in mind as you prepare your résumé for consideration.

Dos and Don'ts of Applying

Do market all your skills and experience; don't sell yourself short. When developing your résumé, be sure that the "one-page résumé syndrome" does not hinder your chance to note pertinent Peace Corps experience in detail. Include as much relevant work and overseas experience, as many languages spoken, and as much other information as you can to help you stand out from other applicants. Additionally, make note of any training programs, panel discussions, or seminars you facilitated as a Volunteer. Remember to include any experience as an educator, such as curriculum development or session design. Don't assume the reader is aware of the responsibilities you may have had; come right out and state them, even if they seem obvious to

Do refer to your description of service (remember the DOS?), and put it to use rather than leaving it filed it away somewhere. There are a lot of details in your DOS that you may have forgotten about.

Do talk to other people who may have experience conducting

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training for the Peace Corps. You may know fellow Volunteers who assisted with pre-service training, or you may still be in contact with your training coordinator. Take some time to get more information from them to determine how your strengths can help meet the needs of overseas posts.

Don't wait until the last minute when you are in need of work. Plan ahead and be patient. In general, the STAU begins communication with an overseas post about four to six months prior to the scheduled training or consulting activity. Many details are involved, and it can be a long process before a contract is signed. Remember the process for becoming a Peace Corps Volunteer? Well, this process is not that long, but patience is helpful.

Don't be discouraged. Keep your files updated and stay in contact with STAU. Sometimes, other departments at the Peace Corps contact STAU when they are in need of a contractor for various training, workshop, desktop publishing, and other short-term assignments.

Good Candidate Traits

"Some people think training is like a certain quote from Shakespeare," says RPCV Janeen Dorsch (Macedonia 1996-99), "'a tale told by an idiot, full of sound and fury, signifying nothing.' Those folks don't usually do so well. Training is a give-and-take affair—trainees give of themselves to each other and the host nationals, and they learn to identify and take what they need from the resources provided them. As trainers, we simply facilitate these actions."

The most important advice: Candidates should be flexible with schedules and assignments. Sometimes, you may have six months to prepare for a contract. Other times, you may be offered an assignment at the very last minute. Also, you should not expect any specific position or location.

Specialization in one or more of the following areas is beneficial: community-based training, community outreach, agriculture, education, women in development, gender and development, diversity, forestry, health, HIV/AIDS, computer information technology, TEFL, math, crosscultural relations, language testing, small business development, and youth development. Region- and country-specific experience and multiple language skills are also highly desirable.

Among the most marketable skills are strong management and organizational skills; experience in designing, facilitating, and implementing experiential training; group facilitation and stand-up training; overseas experience; counseling experience; and ability to provide guidance and staff training in appropriate training techniques, methodology, design, evaluation, and participant assessment.

Rewards and Benefits

"Working as a short-term contractor gives one an opportunity to continue the same commitment to a country, people, or ideal that one made as a PCV," says RPCV Gregory Shaughnessy (Czechoslovakia 1991-93 and Slovakia 1994-96). "You become part of that all-important first impression that each new training group receives during PST and that will, most likely, guide them throughout their service as Volunteers. A belief in the goals of the Peace Corps and the benefits of service, combined with firsthand Volunteer experience, makes RPCVs ideal candidates for such positions."

Contractors work overseas and are compensated on a daily rate based on their professional salary history, relevant past work experience, and the compensation range established for the position. Additionally, travel expenses, per diem, insurance, and immunizations are provided.

Short-term training experience in the Peace Corps is a tremendous asset when searching for a job. A three-month training contract will not only enhance your skills and look good on your résumé but could lead to other opportunities. One example is RPCV Terry Armstrong (Jamaica and Seychelles), a Peace Corps programming and training officer for Romania whose experience in short-term contracting launched him onto a new career path.

"I volunteered for the Peace Corps with the intention of returning to my job in the United States after two years," says Armstrong. "Instead, I served for a third year in a second country and then returned to my first country on a contract to coordinate technical training during a PST. That led to a series of short-term PST contracts and then to a longer contract to support programming and training in two posts. And all of that led to a direct-hire position with the Peace Corps. None of this was by design but, rather, [the result of] a variety of opportunities that I couldn't resist. My first contract pointed me in a direction that has been tremendously challenging and rewarding."
