Frequently Asked Questions About the Fellows/USA Program

hen it comes to your future you want it all... You want to get a better theoretical background in your field in school and gain practical experience in the workplace. You want to work in development without leaving the United States. You want to continue in service to needy communities and receive tangible rewards for yourself.

As a returned Peace Corps Volunteer (RPCV), you can do all of those things at once with the Peace Corps Fellows/USA Program and have "the best of both worlds." This article will answer some frequently asked questions and provide you with more information about how to participate in this exciting program.

What is the Fellows/USA Program?

The Fellows/USA Program offers RPCVs the opportunity to integrate their Peace Corps experience with academic degree programs and, at the same time, make a difference in communities here at home. Through the Fellows/USA Program, RPCVs are eligible to receive scholarships or reduced tuition in advanced degree programs at more than 25 colleges and universities that participate in the program.

In return for these education benefits, Fellows commit to work for two years in an under-served community as they pursue their academic degree. Fellows often apply the skills they acquired serving overseas as Peace

Corps Volunteers while working in their communities. For example, they teach in public schools, work in public health facilities, and contribute to community and economic development projects.

In addition to scholarships or reduced tuition, Fellows are paid a stipend for their service to the community. In the process, they enhance their skills and make themselves more marketable for new careers.

To date, nearly 1,500 RPCVs have taken advantage of the opportunities that the Peace Corps Fellows/ USA Program offers.



How long after completion of Peace Corps service am I eligible to apply to the Fellows/USA Program?

You can apply to a Peace Corps Fellows/ USA Program at any time after your Peace Corps service. Peggy Benz, a Peace Corps Fellow in the Applied Economic Development Program at Illinois State University, has been out of the Peace Corps for 19 years.

Peggy says, "Being an older student has made my focus on career goals much clearer. I have a better handle on what I want to do, and on what I need to do and learn in school."

Am I still eligible for a Fellows/USA Program even if I didn't complete the full two years of service?

Fellows/USA Programs are competitive, and preference may be given to RPCVs who have served the full two years.

However, you may still be eligible if you have completed the full tour minus up to 90 days if you returned home on emergency leave; have been granted an Early Close of Service or a Non-Disciplinary Discontinuance of Service; or have been medically separated after completion of one year of service (including training).

What types are degrees are offered through the Fellows/USA Program?

About half of the Fellows/USA Programs are in the field of education, while the remaining programs are in the broad field of community and economic development.

Degrees are awarded at a number of levels, including: BS in Nursing; Master of Public Health (MPH); Master of Public Management (MPM); Master of Community and Regional Planning, Master of Public Administration; MA degrees in social and public policy, economics, political science, human development, regional planning, rural plan-



ning; MS degrees in applied economics, sociology, criminal justice, geography, gerontology; and, of course, masters degree programs in many areas of education.

Some programs offer Ph.D. degrees, and we continue to add new programs that reflect areas of interest to RPCVs.

Can the Fellows/USA Program really make graduate school affordable for me?

As an RPCV, you are eligible for a number of benefits such as tuition assistance, yearly stipends, housing, paid employment, and health benefits. In exchange for a two-year commitment to work in a community that needs your help, you can earn a master's degree, establish your career, and pay much less than you would have if you had not served in the Peace Corps.

In exchange for these benefits, universities ask that you make a minimum of a two-year commitment to an academic program and to a community. Some universities also ask that Fellows make a commitment to work in the community for a period of time after graduation.

Why does the Peace Corps have a program to assist under-served American communities?

Much of the work of the Peace Corps does take place overseas, but that is only part of the story. The Peace Corps has an important "Domestic Dividend" as well. The Fellows/USA Program is a way for needy urban, rural, and reservation communities here in the States to benefit from the training and experience that you gained in the Peace Corps. Sargent Shriver, the first Director of the Peace Corps said, "The mission thirty years ago was overseas. The mission today is both overseas and in America."

The technical know-how and cultural sensitivity that you have can assist local community residents as they claim ownership of their own community enhancement programs. Because of your proven experience in adapting to a different environment and circumstance, you are uniquely qualified to work with a wide spectrum of cultural and ethnic groups.

I see myself working overseas - don't I need an "international" degree?

Many of the Fellows/USA Programs focus on linking internationally. In a Fellows/USA Program you will be in the position to balance lessons learned through work in communities in the States with your experience overseas. There are international applications of the skills you develop work-

ing in an American community. Universities value RPCVs, in part, for their international experience, which adds a new perspective to the classroom, the university, and the greater community.

There are a lot of Fellows/USA Programs - how are they different?

Not only are the degree offerings diverse, but Fellows/USA Programs also have different admission policies, different combinations of financial assistance and employment opportunities, and different curricula. In addition, they are geographically and culturally diverse. Talking to different program coordinators will help you assess the potential benefits for you.

Can I really find challenging work with diverse populations here in the United States?

You may find many communities in the United States to be much different than you expected. The Fellows/USA Programs work in needy urban, rural and reservation communities across the country. These communities are multicultural and diverse, and they need you and your skills.

I got so much hands-on experience while in the Peace Corps, won't I be bored going back to the classroom?

Each of the Fellows/USA Programs has a full or part-time work component. This practical, handson learning component is one of the things that makes the Fellows/USA Programs so special. The traditional university curriculum has been adapted to reflect the "real world" experience you are gaining. You will put into practice almost immediately what you learned overseas and what you are learning in the program, and you will get paid for it.
