## **Guide to Environmental Careers**

he United Nations predicts that by 2043 the world population will reach the 9 billion mark. For this reason, the search for solutions to environmental constraints is creating more opportunities in the environmental field to protect and improve our air, water, land, and living resources.

If you are interested in an environmental career, you should consider the largest single employer in that field—the federal government. The Environmental Protection Agency, for example, employs 18,000 people at its headquarters in Washington, D.C., 10 regional offices, and 17 laboratories across the United States. You will find a myriad of jobs if you visit the agency's website at www.epa.gov.

Another branch of the federal government involved with environmental issues is the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration. As the name implies, this agency primarily manages the nation's coastal and marine resources. More information on its goals and employment opportunities can be found at www.noaa.gov. The National Park Service (www.nps.gov), the U.S. Geological Survey (www.usgs.gov), and the Justice Department (www.usdoj.gov) are additional federal agencies that are looking to fill positions with qualified staff.

Many career options exist in advocacy and conservation work. For example, The Chesapeake Bay Foundation (www.cbf.org), the Solar Energy Industry Association(www.seia.org), and American Wildlands (www.wildlands.org) are good possibilities for researching environmentally oriented job opportunities. In addition, numerous philanthropic organizations exist whose mission is to conserve, protect, and restore the environment. You can search a national database of nonprofit environmental organizations by visiting www.guidestar.org. Type the word "environment" in the "quick search" box for an updated list of employment opportunities.

If you are interested in an environmental career, you should consider the largest single employer in that field—the federal government.

Environmental organizations on the national level include the Nature Conservancy (www.nature.org), the Sierra Club (www.sierraclub.org), the National Audubon Society (www.audubon.org), and the National Wildlife Federation (www.nwf.org).

Organizations on the state and local level include the Greater Yellowstone Coalition (www.greateryellowstone.org), the Stony Brook-Millstone Watershed Association(www.thewatershed.org), and the California Marine Mammal Center (www.marinemammalcenter.org). A search on the Internet or at your local library or bookstore should yield additional names.

Listings for jobs in nonprofits, corporations, and the government in environmental policy, communications, and advocacy; conservation; science and engineering; and education can be found on the website of Environmental Career Opportunity (www.ecojobs.com). Subscribing to professional journals and networking with environmental professionals are other ways to find opportunities in the field. Visit the website of the Environmental Support Center (www.envsc.org) to learn how its assistance to more than 1,700 local, state, and regional organizations helped empower environmental groups. You will find an overview of environmental groups and organizations in your geographic region that may offer employment opportunities.

Employment prospects in elementary, secondary, postsecondary schools include positions as resource staff, environmental science and technology teachers, and research faculty. Additionally, if you are a journalist, you might consider looking for a position in communications, in mass media, or as an information officer for public agencies. Parks, nature centers, museums, zoological gardens, and tourist centers are just a few examples of employers seeking to spread their message of environmental stewardship.

While the list of environmental employers is incredibly diverse, opportunities are expanding in nonenvironmental businesses. For instance, the implementation of new environmental laws and regulations is generating openings for "green" professionals to work with attorneys, architects, energy companies, and real-estate developers in helping employers comply with state and federal laws.

The Occupational Outlook Handbook produced by the U.S. Department of Labor and its Bureau of Labor Statistics is an excellent resource for environmental opportunities, as is the bureau's website (www.bls.gov). The publication Careers in the Environment (VGM Professional Careers Series) by Michael Fasulo and Paul Walker has sections on environmental education and employment trends and offers tips for job hunters. The Nature Directory: A Guide to Environmental Organizations by Susan D. Lanier-Graham provides information on 130 major national and regional organizations devoted to nature and the environment. Current environmental trends and their implications for the job market are examined in The Complete Guide to Environmental Careers in the 21st Century by Kevin Doyle. This book also presents information on career opportunities in fields such as education, communications, energy management and conservation, fisheries and wildlife management, forestry, and land and water conservation.

If you are interested in receiving the advice of career services and employment professionals, visit the Environmental Careers Organization's website (www.eco.org) for tips on careers in the environment, conservation, and sustainability fields. Like many other environment-related websites, this site answers questions from users on career planning and environmental job trends.

The Environmental Careers Manual, produced by Returned Volunteer Services, is another great resource for Peace Corps Volunteers and returned Peace Corps Volunteers who are pursuing a career in an environment-related field. The publication provides an overview of the industry complete with jobsearch resources and can be ordered (free of charge) from RVS at www.peacecorps.gov/publications/career\_order.cfm. An updated edition will be available in 2003. The Career Information Consultants Guide, an RVS job-search network publication, can assist you in finding RPCVs with environmental employment experience. It lists RPCVs who have agreed to answer career-related inquiries from PCVs and RPCVs on a voluntary basis.

With so many places to look, you might find your job search overwhelming or frustrating. To overcome this mind-set, do a thorough inventory of your skills and qualifications prior to creating your résumé and narrow your research to the areas and careers that interest you the most. The prospects for a career in the environmental field have never looked brighter. Your Peace Corps service is likely to have provided you with a good set of transferable skills to launch you on the "green road" to employment in this field. Good luck on your journey.
