Embarking on a Career in Public Relations or Marketing

ave you ever felt like you spent much of your Peace Corps service doing "PR" for the United States, educating host country nationals about what life is really like in our country? For those of you who enjoyed this activity and have decided to try to break into the field of public relations or marketing after your close of service, I'd like to offer some advice based on my own experience.

Definitions

I should begin by explaining the difference between PR and marketing. According to Merriam-Webster's Collegiate Dictionary online (www.mw.com), public relations is "the business of inducing the public to have understanding for and goodwill toward a person, firm, or institution." Most of the time, PR professionals try to do this without spending much money—by trying to get their stories covered by the media and their public service announcements aired on radio and television. This task becomes easier as they cultivate positive relationships with reporters and editors.

In the same dictionary, marketing is defined as "the process or technique of promoting, selling, and distributing a product or service." Marketing is more about selling a service or product than about building an image. Marketing professionals conduct quantitative and qualitative research on the demographics and psychographics of their target markets to determine the most efficient and cost-effective strategies for obtaining their business. This usually involves launching an advertising campaign and organizing promotional events.

Marketing for Peace Corps Fellows/USA

As marketing coordinator for Peace Corps Fellows/USA, my goal is to recruit returned Peace Corps Volunteers for more than 30 Fellows/USA programs across the country where they earn graduate degrees at reduced cost and hold internships in underserved U.S. communities. There is also a degree of public relations involved in my job, however. If I build a positive image of the program centered around the remarkable work that RPCVs are doing at the grassroots level, this helps to generate more interest in the program.

The Benefits of a Career in PR or Marketing

My career in PR and marketing began 10 years ago. I have worked in the nonprofit, private, and public sectors and in the sports, health, education, and international development industries.

Before I began my Peace Corps service in the Russian Far East, where I taught English, I had already been working in PR and marketing for four years. Ever since my senior year in high school I knew that this field was for me. It appealed to me because it would enable me to combine my love of writing with my desire for interaction with people and my talent for sales. I had heard that PR and marketing positions offer a lot of variety in dayto-day activities, and I later found this to be true. No two of my days are alike. Some days I work at my desk writing an article or laying out a newsletter;

other days I might be exhibiting at a trade show, directing a special event, traveling to discuss marketing strategies with clients, or sitting in a video production booth directing the creation of a promotional video.

Preparing for Your Career

For my undergraduate studies, I attended Ohio University and earned a bachelor of science in journalism with a specialization in public relations. My coursework and my involvement with professional organizations such as the Association for Women in Communications and the Public Relations Student Society of America helped prepare me for practical internships and, finally, my first PR job. But someone without an undergraduate background in PR or marketing can still embark on this exciting and limitless career.

Especially if your background is in English or business, you might be able to slide right into an entrylevel PR or marketing position after Peace Corps service. But if you lack prior experience in the field, you will probably have to "pay your dues" for a while, working at a low salary until you've gained experience to build your résumé. It may help if you apply for jobs in an industry within your area of expertise. For example, if your background is in environmental studies, you could apply for a PR position at an organization that works to protect biodiversity or stop climate change. Your knowledge of the environment might be more

important to the organization than prior experience in public relations.

For most, I recommend enrolling in graduate school. A variety of programs can teach you most of the essential skills to be successful in a PR or marketing career. For example, you might enroll in a journalism program and specialize or minor in public relations or marketing. Or you could choose a master of business administration (MBA) program and specialize in marketing. Another option is to enroll in a communications program and specialize in PR, marketing, or journalism. No matter which type of program you choose, you should carefully select courses that will teach you the necessary skills for your field.

Journalism Programs

I focus on journalism programs in this article because I received my training in such a program. Although I may seem biased toward these programs, that is only because I believe being able to write well is the most essential skill for PR and marketing professionals. In my experience, interns who come from marketing programs do not know how to write as well as interns who come from journalism programs, who are better at writing in a concise manner for their target audiences. In PR and marketing, writing will be your main tool for persuasion unless you end up working for a wealthy company that can afford to hire contractors to produce its ad and brochure copy and video scripts. I wouldn't count on this, however. Your ability to write well is likely to be your most marketable asset.

In addition to teaching you to write and edit, journalism schools provide training in practical subjects like publication management and design. PR and marketing people are often charged with creating newsletters and brochures, so it is important to know how to plan, organize, and lay them out. By taking a graphic design course that offers instruction in applications like PageMaker, QuarkXpress, and Photoshop, you will not only be more attractive to employers but gain greater confidence as a PR or marketing professional. Also, if you are able to complete some of the design work that an organization would normally have to hire a contractor to do, you will save your employer a lot of money.

My only regret about my undergraduate studies is that I never took a marketing course. Although I believe that much of marketing is instinctual (and if you have training in public relations, many of the concepts overlap), I still wish I had formal training in the subject. If you choose to apply to a graduate program in journalism, I suggest that you fit some marketing courses into your schedule—even if it means taking an accounting or economics class as a prerequisite.

Other Programs

If you do not choose a journalism program, I cannot overemphasize the importance of taking some journalistic writing

classes as electives. Taking a public relations or media relations class would be beneficial as well. Whether you end up working in PR or in marketing, at some point you are likely to have to send a news release to the media about your organization, product, or service. There are certain steps you can take to increase the chances that media will print the release or cover your story. For example, a news release should be written in Associated Press style. Also, you need to be able to determine which stories are actually newsworthy and would be interesting to a newspaper or a radio or television station. In addition, having contacts at media outlets, or at least knowing the names of editors or reporters who specialize in your subject area, increases your chances of getting your story covered.

No matter what type of graduate program you choose, I also recommend taking a class in website design. As a PR or marketing professional you are likely to be involved in the creation or modification of an organization's website. Even if you don't learn HTML, you should be familiar with how a website is built.

Another worthwhile area of study is fundraising. Especially if you want to work in the nonprofit world, being able to bring funds to your organization means job security. Many PR and marketing professionals get involved with either securing or servicing benefactors or sponsors for their organizations. They might be involved in any stage of the process, from identifying and soliciting potential benefactors or sponsors to providing them with media kits, news clippings, or annual reports.

By now, it should be clear how multifaceted, flexible, and dynamic a career in PR and marketing can be. If you follow the plan I have outlined above, you should acquire enough skills to make you marketable to almost any type of organization. Most organizations need a talented writer on staff and someone who knows how to promote their image and the goods or services they offer. With writing and promotional skills, you should have an advantage over others in the job market when it comes to marketing yourself.
