Help Others and Earn a Graduate Degree Through Fellows/USA

ot long ago, Becca Cornfeld traveled halfway around the world to serve others. As a Peace Corps Volunteer in Uzbekistan from 1999 to 2001, she worked through cultural differences to lead classes in self-esteem and team-building and to teach elementary English to teenage girls.

Now, thanks to her Peace Corps experience, she continues to serve others much closer to home while earning a master's degree through Peace Corps Fellows/USA.

Reduced-Cost Graduate Study/ U.S. Internships

Peace Corps Fellows/USA provides opportunities for reduced-cost graduate study to returned Volunteers who agree to undertake internships in underserved U.S. communities.

Cornfeld, of Rockville, Maryland,
is a Peace Corps Fellow with the
Shriver Peaceworker Program at the
University of Maryland, Baltimore
County. In addition to taking courses
toward her social work degree, for the
past year she has been an intern at
Family Connections in Baltimore,
where she has counseled and advocated
for inner-city families in need.

Although Fellows/USA internships are a requirement, most Peace Corps Fellows do not need external motivation to help others. For example, Cornfeld learned about giving back to her community from her parents, who instilled in their children the values of volunteerism. Her brother was a Peace Corps Volunteer in Namibia.

"Service will always be a part of my life," said Cornfeld. "Seeing the inequalities present in America is very disturbing to me. Having the education and being able to do something about it pushes me. Rather than accept the way things are, I can advocate for change in some form."

Wide Range of Fields

Although dedication to service is a common motivation for Peace Corps Fellows, the degrees they pursue and their internships vary. Peace Corps fellowships are available in a wide range of fields, including business, community and economic development, health, environmental studies, and teacher education.

Fellows internships not only provide a service to needy communities, they also sharpen the skills former Volunteers gained overseas and provide them with valuable on-the-job experience.

Jim Burkett, of Clyde, Ohio, served from 1962 to 1964—among the first Peace Corps Volunteers. In Ecuador, he helped improve the local agricultural economy and taught English in the evenings. Nearly 40 years later, he became a Peace Corps Fellow at the University of Texas at El Paso and uses the skills he acquired as a Volunteer to teach high school biology and chemistry to at-risk youth.

His knowledge of Spanish from his experience in Ecuador helps him understand and communicate with his mostly Latino students. Burkett, who recently completed his teacher certification, is also working toward a master's in geochemistry environmental science, with a focus on nuclear waste disposal.

Debra Pinkney of Brandywine, Maryland, is a Peace Corps Fellow

at the University of Arizona, pursuing her master's degree in public health with a concentration in health education and behavioral sciences. As an intern with United Communities Health Centers (UCHC), a community-based clinic in rural Arizona, Pinkney benefits from the practical experience she gained as a nutrition extension Volunteer in Niger from 1998 to 2000.

At UCHC, her main responsibility is assisting with long-term strategic planning. She also organizes focus groups to provide community members living in rural and hard-to-access areas with opportunities to voice their health care concerns and to discuss possible health disparities in the community.

Fellows/USA is a collaboration of universities, public school systems, community agencies, the Peace Corps, and various funders. Since the program's inception in 1985, more than 1,800 former Peace Corps Volunteers have participated in Fellows/USA, benefiting thousands of people throughout the United States.

Currently, there are more than 300 Peace Corps Fellows across the United States who are committed to completing service-oriented internships before graduating with master's or doctoral degrees. Fellows/ USA has partnerships with more than 30 universities nationwide.
