NOAA's Gray's Reef National Marine Sanctuary has set the dates for its 2006 Ocean Film Festival as September 22, 23, 24.

The Gray's Reef Ocean Film Festival presents ocean-themed films to educate, inspire and foster a spirit of ocean stewardship with films that explore our relationship to the sea, the coastlines and the estuarine environments and our national marine sanctuaries.

The festival is put on solely by Gray's Reef National Marine Sanctuary. There is no charge to the public to attend any of the films screened.

Gray's Reef was designated as a National Marine Sanctuary in January 1981. It is one of the largest near shore live-bottom reefs off the southeastern United States, encompassing approximately 17 square nautical miles. The area earned sanctuary designation in 1981. GRNMS consists of a series of sandstone outcroppings and ledges up to ten feet in height, in a predominantly sandy, flat-bottomed sea floor. The live bottom and ledge habitat support an abundant reef fish and invertebrate community. Loggerhead sea turtles, a threatened species, also use Gray's Reef year-round for foraging and resting, and the reef is within the known winter calving ground for the highly endangered Northern Right Whale.
