Lincoln Assassination Conspirators

With the 200th anniversary of Abraham Lincoln's birth this past February, we begin a year's reflection on Lincoln, as well as the beginning of the sesquicentennial commemoration of the Civil War-the pivotal event of Lincoln's life.

NARA's Regional Archives system holds a wealth of records that provide insight into this critical period of U.S. history. Some of the most frequently requested records include series detailing military recruitment and service, armaments and logistics, and enslavement and emancipation of African Americans. Filed among these often routine correspondence and transactional accounts are hidden treasures that can illuminate or broaden our perspective on other aspects or events of the Civil war era.

The hidden treasures featured this month document one of the greatest manhunts and trials in United States history-that of the Lincoln assassination conspirators. They are very modest-looking pieces of paper. Their very modesty and quotidian nature belie the volatile story.

The first is a multipage telegram, sent on April 15, 1865, describing the suspected assassin of Secretary of State William H. Seward-the equivalent of the modern "BOLO" or "APB" familiar to readers and viewers of thrillers and police procedurals. The last paragraph directs: "Use every exertion to arrest him, and call to your aid the entire force under your control. Invoke the aid of all citizens." The original con-

spiracy called for the assassination of Seward and Vice President Johnson as well as Lincoln. The person assigned to the Vice President got cold feet. Lewis Thornton Powell severely wounded Seward and his son (both recovered). Powell was captured in Washington, DC, on the 17th. Copies of this telegram reside in the Civil War Provost Marshal (NARA Record Group 110) correspondence files of several posts from New York to Maryland.

Another piece of routine correspondence among the same

THE LETTERBOOK OF JOHN FREDERICK HARTRANFT. American Gelegraph Sompang,

records reports the delivery and incarceration of Junius Brutus Booth. John Wilkes Booth's eldest brother was among many of the people arrested and questioned during the manhunt. Junius, also an actor, had been performing in

> Cincinnati. He was arrested in Philadelphia at his sister Asia's house, together with Asia's husband, John Sleeper Clarke. Booth had left correspondence at that house that proved Junius knew of the plot.

> In the last document, handwritten copies of Mai. Gen. John Frederick Hartranft's daily reports detail the final days of the conspirators. Hartranft's final assignment of the Civil War was to guard and care for the conspirators during their incarceration. When their trial began, the nation waited eagerly for news, and many sought retribution against those they held responsible for the nation's grief. Hartranft resisted calls for both vengeance and mercy and continued to treat his notorious charges as humanely as possible, facilitating meetings with clergy and sending letters to and from family members. Yet, as his detached, detailed description of the execution of four of the conspirators shows, he did not allow emotion to impede the performance of his duty.
