Hawaii Students

What is the problem?

The 2007 Hawaii Youth Risk Behavior Survey indicates that among high school students:

Weapons

- 15% carried a weapon, such as a gun, knife, or club. (1)
- – carried a gun. (1)
- 4% carried a weapon, such as a gun, knife, or club, on school property. (1)
- 6% had been threatened or injured with a weapon, such as a gun, knife, or club, on school property. (2)

Physical Violence

- 29% were in a physical fight. (2)
- 3% were injured in a physical fight and had to be treated by a doctor or nurse. (2)
- 7% were in a physical fight on school property. (2)
- 9% were hit, slapped, or physically hurt on purpose by their boyfriend or girlfriend. (3)

Security

- 8% did not go to school because they felt unsafe at school or on their way to or from school. (1)
- 28% had property, such as a car, clothing, or books, stolen or deliberately damaged on school property. (2)

What are the solutions?

Better health education • Violence prevention programs • Healthier school environments

What is the status?

The 2006 Hawaii School Health Profiles indicates that among middle schools and high schools:

Health Education

- 31% required students to take two or more health education courses.
- 91% tried to increase student knowledge on violence prevention in a required health education course.
- 88% tried to improve student conflict resolution skills, such as techniques to resolve interpersonal conflicts without fighting in a required health education course.
- 56% had a lead health education teacher who received staff development during the past two years on violence prevention.

Violence Prevention Programs

- 3% had or participated in a safe-passages to school program.
- 42% had or participated in a program to prevent gang violence.
- 62% had or participated in a program to prevent bullying.

School Environment

- 88% used staff or adult volunteers to monitor school halls during and between classes.
- 98% required visitors to report to the main office or reception area upon arrival.
- 94% maintained a "closed campus" where students are not allowed to leave school during the day, including during lunchtime.
- 2% routinely conducted locker searches.
- 43% required students to wear identification badges.
- 21% used security or surveillance cameras, either inside or outside the school building.
- 77% used police, school resource officers, or security guards during the regular school day.
