WHEREAS, Richard Tucker, after 31 years of government service, 21 years of that service with the Federal Home Loan Bank System, has announced his retirement from the Federal Housing Finance Board;

WHEREAS, in 1989 Mr. Tucker was a primary creator of the Affordable Housing Program (AHP) and continued to be an articulate and visible spokesman for the AHP and Community Investment Program for the last ten years; at the same time he established an excellent relationship with the Bank System Community Investment Officers that enabled the program to be the national success that it is today;

WHEREAS, the Federal Housing Finance Board finds Mr. Tucker to be an individual of the highest distinction who, by his sustained efforts, championed the transfer of the jurisdiction of the AHP to the Federal Home Loan Bank System and the introduction of the Community Investment Cash Advance Program;

WHEREAS, in addition to his professional contributions, Mr. Tucker was co-captain of the 1988 Federal Home Loan Bank Board Tennis Team which captured its first Federal Interagency Departmental League 'C' Division Championship;

WHEREAS, Mr. Tucker, husband of Mimi Kolesar, father of Valerie and Stephanie, and beloved Grandfather to Jacob Tucker Cave, will now have more time to spend with his family;

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS RESOLVED that the Federal Housing Finance Board and its employees express their gratitude and deep appreciation to Richard Tucker for his superior contributions, both professional and personal, to the Federal Home Loan Bank System and wish him every success and happiness in his new endeavors.
