Citizen Form Letter. This letter was emailed by 2971 individuals from around the country. Some of the form letters contained separate opening paragraphs which are attached to the letter.

Dear Vice Admiral Lautenbacher,

I strongly oppose the proposed regulatory changes to the Coastal Zone Management Act (CZMA) and urge you not to undertake these changes. The Act has a 30-year record of success in managing the competing uses of our coastal zones. The proposed rule, if enacted, upends the balance of power intended by Congress between federal and state agencies, making it easier for the oil and gas industry to ignore legitimate environmental concerns raised by states and local governments. While the industry asserts these rules will "streamline" the process, I believe the rules do so only in that they limit the states' voice and role in the process, allowing this Administration to give away my coast to the oil and gas industry. The public and the states should be afforded every right to have a voice in the management of our own coastal areas.

In particular, I object to changes that exempt certain development activities from requiring state review and to the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration's abdication of authority to the Minerals Management Service with respect to future offshore oil and gas development plans. In addition, many of the proposed review time lines are so short that states will not have the ability to provide public notice and receive comments on proposed projects. The proposed rule also arbitrarily cuts off a state's ability to ask for information from industry, irrespective of the importance of that information to informed decision-making.

The combined effect of the proposed rule changes is to usurp state's rights established and strengthened by Congress, NOAA's own regulations, and three decades of practice, at the expense of our coasts. These rule changes ultimately facilitate coastal oil and gas development without regard for any other use or user of our coasts.

I urge you to withdraw the proposed CZMA rule changes.

Opening Paragraphs - The Following Paragraphs were Included in some of the Form Letters:

As a former resident of Maryland and a regular visitor to coastal California, I am well aware of the benefits of local control of coastal zones by states and local jurisdictions under the Coastal Zone Management Act (CZMA). I strongly oppose the proposed regulatory changes to CZMA and urge you not to undertake these changes. Right now the oil and gas industries are trying to ride roughshod over many state and local protections in order to exploit resources. If the proposed changes to CZMA go through, citizens' rights, as well as those of the environment, will be totally secondary to the financial benefits a few will reap. This is not right. I do not want this Administration to give away my coast to the oil and gas industry. The public and the states should be afforded every right to have a voice in the management of our own coastal areas.

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Why must we jump like the boy at the dike, putting our fingers into one leak after another? 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America must protect its coastal areas. There must not be changes to upset the balance of nature in the coastal areas. Oil, gas or logging companies must not ever gain footholds at our America's coastal areas, either. These proposals will make it easy to gain access to them.

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I am very disappointed at the environmental record which has been set by this administration. We need to protect all areas of our environment instead of destroying them as they seem to be trying to do.

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We need cleaner oceans, coasts, seas, air and water. Marine and wildlife and forests need protection from careless predatory man.
