MEETING NOTES

1. Discussion of lessons learned/what has and has not worked for international grants

- Several members mentioned that there is not enough allocation of resources to evaluate and disseminate results from projects. Funding should have some provisions for technical assistance, to help smaller NGOs in the administration and reporting requirements of funding.
- -Several members commented on the cumbersome application process for both NFWF and NOAA International Coral Grants, which can be challenging for developing country partners. In particular, NFWF's logic model requirement and NOAA's grants.gov process are difficult.
- TNC suggested that NOAA conduct a sort of meta-analysis of data from coral grants projects. There should be a more systematic way to connect results from varied projects, and provide a more robust analysis.
- NMFS commented that grants are currently not directed at Roadmap threat areas, and should align with these major theme areas. Some emphasis should be given to key indicator fish species, ensuring that research is done on such species, and engaging the fisheries aspect is part of the general "conversation," taking an ecosystem approach.
- International Trade: This issue is often brought up, and there seems to be consensus from NMFS that trade of coral reef-related species needs to be fully addressed.

On lack of NFWF funding of international coral work:

- NFWF filled an important niche. NFWF was willing to fund work in all coral reef areas of the world, unlike most other coral grants. Therefore, these grants represent a unique funding mechanism.
- Many of the grants they had were, however, relatively small but came with significant requirements. Often, the accountability and application process for small grants was such that it discouraged NGOs from applying. They were a lot of work, but for relatively small funding amounts. Increases in funding caps should be considered.
