## **January**

A "Ben" of-All-Trades New! Date: Saturday, January 12, 2008

**Location:** The Independence Park Institute Education Center at the Independence Living History Center (corner of 3<sup>rd</sup> and Chestnut Streets) – please enter through the Dock Street doors/ school group entrance. **Description:** Come spend the morning learning about Benjamin Franklin, a jack; or should I say Ben; of all-trades. This session provides teachers with many helpful and practical ideas for lesson plans, engaging classroom activities, and assessments that can be done using primary source materials related to Franklin's life and achievements. Good teaching resources such as books and websites will be shared.

We will also take a field trip to Franklin Courtyard, where teachers can view the actual foundations and privy pit of Franklin's home. Next we will visit the Franklin Court Printing Office to see a demonstration of how Franklin's printing press actually worked. Franklin printed newspapers, almanacs, and money, as well as contributing to many of these publications through his own writing. We will end our morning in the Underground Museum where you can explore the museum's exhibits on Franklin's life and view a film about his incredible talents and achievements.

### From Paper to the Press

Date: Saturday, February 23, 2008

**Location:** Workshop begins at Historic RittenhouseTown (206 Lincoln Drive, Philadelphia, PA, 19144). Participants will be transported to Independence National Historical Park and back to RittenhouseTown during this workshop.

**Description:** Come learn about the history of paper and how it is made at

the site of America's first paper mill, Historic RittenhouseTown. Participants will tour the site and make paper using the same tools and methods that were used in the 18<sup>th</sup> century. After a picnic lunch, all will board the bus to Independence NHP.



At Independence NHP educators will learn what paper meant to the founding of our country and 18<sup>th</sup> century America. See a printing demonstration at the Franklin Court Printing Office. Then explore the Independence Park Institute's newly opened Benjamin Franklin: Man of Many Talents Learning Lab where you will try setting your name in type as well as many of Franklin's other activities. At each location, teachers will learn about education programs and field trip opportunities.


**Description:** Discover what archeology is and how we learn from what
