## 2008 Summer Institute for Teachers Discovering History through Archeology

Get ready to uncover the truth of Philadelphia's buried past and how we learn from what others leave behind in this summer's Independence Park Institute teachers' workshop!

From July 14-18 2008, Independence National Historical Park will host a one-week institute that will enable 4<sup>th</sup>-12<sup>th</sup> grade teachers to discover how historians and archeologists piece together the lives of everyday Philadelphia citizens through the artifacts they left behind.

Participants will learn what archeology is and what it is not. They will go through the archeological process, discover what historians can learn through archeology, and what is done with the new information. Educators will get to interact with historians, archeologists, curators, museum educators, and other professionals in the field. This institute will prepare teachers to use historic documents, artifacts, and images to

enhance their teaching and to inspire students with the stories that make history come alive in the classroom and beyond.

This summer institute is limited to twenty participants. All participants will receive:

- A \$300.00 stipend
- Books and other teaching resource materials
- Field trips to sites in Independence National Historical Park and the historic area
- Continuing education credits for Pennsylvania (Act 48) and New Jersey teachers.

He created the temporary exhibits in the Benjamin Franklin: Man of Many Talents learning lab to help keep the

space colorful with large mounted images of Franklin and his inventions. He has made informative wayside signs that describe the new education facility at the park, including national historic 325 Walnut Street while the space is landmarks and world heritage sites, being constructed.

## The IPI Education Facility at 325 Walnut Street



The renovation of the new Independence Park Institute (IPI) education facility at 325 Walnut Street is nearing completion. Once operational, this new facility will double the programs and the capacity of the IPI. We will be adding three additional learning labs to those we currently have in the Independence Living History Center. These learning labs will give students the opportunity to experience hands-on, interactive programs in which they can role play as delegates to the 2<sup>nd</sup> Continental

Congress or Constitutional Convention in a mock-up of the Assembly Room, explore symbols of freedom like the Liberty Bell, or learn about Philadelphia's connections and significant contributions to antislavery efforts in the 18th and 19th centuries. Over 30,000 school children per year will be able to participate in IPI education programs at this facility when it is fully operational.
