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BOSTON AREA CONSUMER PRICE INDEX: MARCH 2009 Consumer Prices Rise 0.6 Percent

The Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U) in the Boston metropolitan area increased 0.6 percent for the two months ended March 2009, according to the U.S. Department of Labor's Bureau of Labor Statistics. Regional Commissioner Denis M. McSweeney noted that the March advance marked the first bi-monthly price increase in the Boston area since July 2008. The March increase was mainly due to higher prices for apparel and, to a lesser degree, gains within housing, transportation, medical care, other goods and services, and education and communication. Only the food and beverage and recreation indexes declined in March. For the year ended March 2009, the CPI-U for Boston fell 0.4 percent, following a 0.5 percent annual decline posted in January. Core inflation, as measured by the all items less food and energy index, increased by 1.4 percent.

For the two months ended March 2009, apparel prices rose 8.9 percent, mainly due to seasonal increases for women's and girls apparel. Within other goods and services, up 5.2 percent, higher prices for cigarettes led the overall advance since January. Housing costs edged up 0.3 percent due to higher shelter costs, up 0.8 percent. Partially offsetting the overall increase within housing were lower household energy costs, down 3.7 percent since January. Specifically, leading the decline within household energy were lower fuel oil prices and utility (piped) gas service charges, down 6.8 percent. In contrast, food and beverage prices fell 0.6 percent, mainly attributable to lower grocery store prices, down 0.8 percent. Transportation costs rose 0.4 percent largely due to higher gas prices, up 9.4 percent. Medical care costs rose 0.8 percent over the two-month period.

For the year ended March 2009, overall prices in the Boston area edged down 0.4 percent, following a 0.5-percent annual decline in January. The decline was mainly due to lower prices within the transportation category. Transportation expenses declined 12.1 percent over the year, the largest annual decline posted in series history. The steep decline was mainly attributable to lower gas prices, down a sharp 38.5 percent. Boston area motorists paid an average of \$1.933 per gallon in March. Moderating this decrease were increases in food and beverage prices, up 4.7 percent, and to a lesser degree, higher prices within the other goods and services, medical care, and education and communication categories. Food and beverage prices rose because of higher grocery store prices, up 6.0 percent, as well as, higher restaurant prices, up 3.5 percent over the year. Other goods and services expenses rose 11.1 percent over the year, the highest annual increase since September 1990. Medical care and education and communication costs advanced 4.7 and 3.6 percent, respectively since last March. Overall housing costs edged down 0.3 percent attributable to declines within household energy, down 7.8 percent, mainly resulting from lower fuel oil costs. Moderating this decline were higher electricity prices, up 10.9 percent over the year. Recreation and apparel prices edged up 2.0 and 0.8 percent, respectively over the year.

In March, the Boston CPI-U on the 1982-84 base was 232.155. By this gauge, the selected market basket of goods and services which cost area consumers an average of \$10.00 during the 1982-84 reference period would now cost more than double at \$23.22. The purchasing power of the dollar for the Boston area in 1982-84 dollars was 43.1 cents in March 2009. In March, the CPI-W (Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers), at 231.884, was up 0.8 percent since January 2009 and decreased 0.3 percent over the year.

NOTE: Local area CPI indexes are the by-products of the national CPI program. Since each local area index is a small subset of the national index, it has a smaller sample size and is therefore subject to substantially more sampling and other measurement error than that for the national index. In addition, local indexes are not adjusted for seasonal factors. As a result, local area indexes show greater volatility compared with the national index, although their long-term trends are quite similar.
