WHAT IT MEANS FOR EVERYONE

Federal Uses (also see the selected statutory used on the opposite page):

- Used to distribute funds and develop programs for people with disabilities and the elderly under the Rehabilitation Act
- Needed under the Americans with Disabilities Act to ensure that comparable public transportation services are available for all segments of the population
- Required to award Federal grants, under the Older Americans Act, based on the number of elderly people with physical and mental disabilities

Community Impact:

- Used to allocate funds for mass transit systems to provide handicapped facilities under the Federal Transit Act
- Required under the Housing and Urban Development Act to distribute funds for housing for people with disabilities
- Used to allocate funds to states and local areas for employment and job training programs for veterans under the Job Training Partnership Act
- Helps state and local agencies concerned with aging to develop health care and other services tailored to the disabilities of the elderly
- Used by state and county agencies to plan for eligible recipients under the Medicare and Medicaid programs

WHY WE ASK IT THIS WAY

These questions provide information that helps to define disability as a limitation in the ability to perform one or more major life activities. The disability item obtains information about health conditions that limit an individual in activities such as working at a job, going outside the home alone, and taking care of personal needs such as bathing, dressing or getting around inside the home. The individual activities are themselves of critical interest, and the ability to identify persons with a limitation in one or more activities helps determine a valid overall measure of disability status.

WHAT IT MEANS FOR EVERYONE

Federal Uses:

Used by the Census Bureau to comply with legislation (13 U.S.C., Chapter 5, Section 141), passed in the 104th Congress, that states that the decennial census must obtain information about grandparents who have primary responsibility for the care of their grandchildren

WHY WE ASK IT THIS WAY

The aim of these questions is to distinguish between households in which a grandparent temporarily provides a home for a grandchild for a few weeks or months and households in which a grandparent provides a home for a grandchild on a more permanent basis and serves as the primary caregiver for the grandchild. These questions identify both short and long term arrangements for minor grandchildren. Since the legislation specifies "providing a home" for the grandchild, these questions determine if the grandparent has the primary responsibility for the basic needs of the grandchild. Situations in which a grandparent participated in childcare while the child was still primarily under their parent's care should not be included.
