Resiquation from the 9.E.B. would probably be no wore affection than waiting for commutual survival of myself as an authority these.
2) It is probably valuable to increase my authority outside the Foundation as someone the RF cannot afford to lose. The deyraiture of WSC and the prestige of ruouled ge secured by tract in his field (the last) would make my sources less dispensable.

The character of reports and recommendations in e the office, and the brieldinp up through devoted services to personnel here when requested, would undoubtedly struepthen my position here. Reports on MS projects of previous years might be very effectior. The confidence and support of RBF, DLE, 9HW and RLW and AT are valuable. Also evidence of orqauizuep ability in the office is inportant.

1. Having such manifold objections and the lack of a querally accepted phitosoply of education. These is us aqpenment upon the droviable objections to be secured.
2. Uttaly untrained teaching personnel.
3. Limited means of the institutions
4. Intellectual provincial ism - too much local preoccupation a local problems + prestige. Education is not thought of in qquerons on nation al terms.
5. Society in America is breaking into new cleavapy planes and it is probably natural that any, system of 30 grs a gp may outmoded at the present tine.
The problem is whither the $9 \xi B$ can command the services of persons of sufficient prestige and intelliqunce since possible success dyands on getting the service of man who have a somed wadable pliclosoghy of education. The time sequined will be considuable.
