NOAA Coral Reef Conservation Grant Program Each year, subject to the availability of funds, this program supports grants in the following categories: state and territory coral reef ecosystem management; state and territory coral reef ecosystem monitoring; coral reef ecosystem research; projects to improve or amend coral fishery management plans; general coral reef conservation; and international coral reef conservation.

National Fish and Wildlife Foundation (NFWF) Coral Reef Conservation Fund

The Coral Reef Conservation Fund is a partnership between NOAA and the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation. NOAA Undersea Research Program (NURP)

Most of the NOAA Undersea Research Program's research funding is awarded through the NURP centers. Each center advertises research announcements annually based on research guidelines provided by NURP headquarters. NCCOS's Center for Sponsored Coastal Ocean Research/Coastal Ocean Program funds competitively peer reviewed research focused on providing scientific information to assist decision makers in meeting the challenges of managing our nation's coastal resources.
