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## Baltimore Immigration Judge Participates in Naturalization Ceremonies

BALTIMORE – Immigration Judge Phillip T. Williams from the Executive Office for Immigration Review, Baltimore Immigration Court, delivered the keynote speech and administered the oath of citizenship during two naturalization ceremonies for approximately 150 candidates at the George H. Fallon Federal Building.

The ceremonies were hosted by the Baltimore District Office of the U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services, Department of Homeland Security.

## **Biographical Information**

**Phillip T. Williams** was appointed as an immigration judge in August 2008. He received a bachelor of arts degree in 1978 from Temple University, a master of arts degree in 1981 from Howard University, and a juris doctorate in 1986 from Howard University School of Law. From April 1997 to August 2008, Judge Williams served as an Assistant Chief Immigration Judge. From 1995 to March 1997, Judge Williams served as an immigration judge in New York. From 1987 to 1995, he was an attorney for Maggio & Kattar in Washington, DC. From 1984 to 1986, Judge Williams worked as a District of Columbia pre-trial services officer. He is a member of the District of Columbia and Pennsylvania bars.

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The Executive Office for Immigration Review (EOIR) is an agency within the Department of Justice. Under delegated authority from the Attorney General, immigration judges and the Board of Immigration Appeals interpret and adjudicate immigration cases according to United States immigration laws. EOIR's immigration judges conduct administrative court proceedings in immigration courts located throughout the nation. They determine whether foreign-born individuals—who are charged by the Department of Homeland Security with violating immigration law—should be ordered removed from the United States or should be granted relief from removal and be permitted to remain in this country. The Board of Immigration Appeals primarily reviews appeals of decisions by immigration judges. EOIR's Office of the Chief Administrative Hearing Officer adjudicates immigration-related employment cases. EOIR is committed to ensuring fairness in all of the cases it adjudicates.
