





The following are examples of what we learned about faculty characteristics and compensation from NSOFF 99:

 There were about 1.1 million faculty and immunitional staff in 4- and 2-year posterondary mentioatous in the full of 1998.
 Approximately, 36 percent were employed full time and 4.2 percent were employed part time for their permandary institutions.

- Across all institutions of higher education.
 Whates accounted for R5 percent of full-time instructional faculty and staff and R5 percent of port-time instructional faculty and staff.
 Asian insuprised about 6 percent of the full-time instructional faculty and staff. African-American about 5 percent. Hispania-Latinos about 5 percent, and American Indiana less than 1 percent. Minorities accounted for minima proportions of pirt time instructional faculty and staff.
