# CATEGORICAL EXCLUSION

A. Background

**BLM Office**: Glenwood Springs Field Office

<u>Lease/Serial/Case File No</u>: C-9583 / 285002

<u>Proposed Action Title/Type</u>: Replace 1 transmission pole with 4 new pole structures to support a regulator platform, all within existing right-of-way.


Location of Proposed Action: NW ¼ NW ¼ Section 19, T. 4 S., R. 83 W., Sixth Principal Meridian, Eagle County, Colorado.

<u>Description of Proposed Action</u>: The applicant, Holy Cross Energy, has submitted an application to amend their existing Right-of-Way, C-9583. This amendment would entail replacing one wooden pole with four new wood pole structures to support a regulator platform (see attached diagram).

The construction would include the use of two boom trucks, one backhoe, one auger, one flatbed truck, and five Holy Cross Energy personnel. Work is estimated to take five days.

Additionally, the right-of-way corridor is shared with CDOT, CenturyTel of Eagle, Public Service Company of Colorado, and Colorado Ute Electric Association. The applicant has received non-objections from these current holders.





**B.** Land Use Plan Conformance: The Proposed Action is subject to and has been reviewed for and is in conformance with (43 CFR §1610.5 and § 2800, BLM 1617.3) the following plan:

Name of Plan: Record of Decision and Glenwood Springs Resource Management Plan.

<u>Date Approved</u>: January, 1984; revised in 1988; amended in November 1991 - Oil and Gas Leasing and Development - Final Supplemental Environmental Impact Statement; amended Nov. 1996 - <u>Colorado Standards and Guidelines</u>; amended in August 1997 - <u>Castle Peak Travel Management Plan</u>; amended in March 1999 - Oil and Gas Leasing & Development Final Supplemental Environmental Impact Statement; amended in November 1999 - Red Hill Plan Amendment; and amended in September 2002 – Fire Management Plan for Wildland Fire Management and Prescriptive Vegetation Treatment Guidance.

<u>Decision Number/Page</u>: Page 41, Utility and Communication Facility Management.

<u>Decision Language</u>: T respond, in a timely manner, to requests for utility and communication facility authorizations on public land while considering environmental, social, economic, and interagency concerns.

### **C.** Compliance with NEPA:

The Proposed Action is categorically excluded from further documentation under the national Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) in accordance with 516 DM 11.9, E. Realty Numbers:

- (12) Grants of right-of-way wholly within the boundaries of other compatibly developed rights-of-way.
- (13) Amendments to existing rights-of-way, such as the upgrading of existing facilities, which entail no additional disturbances outside of the right-of-way boundary.

This categorical exclusion is appropriate in this situation because there are no extraordinary circumstances potentially having effects that may significantly affect the environment. The proposed action has been reviewed, and none of the extraordinary circumstances described in 516 DM 2 apply.

<u>REMARKS/MITIGATION</u> (the following mitigations will be carried forward within the permit under Special Conditions:

To prevent impacts to raptors and migratory bird species, the power line shall comply with the APLIC's *Suggested Practices for Raptor Protection on Power Lines* publication, and the National Electric Safety Code .

Reference: Avian Power Line Interaction Committee (APLIC). 2006. Suggested Practices for Raptor Protection on Power Lines: The State of the Art in 2006. Edison Electric Institute, APLIC and the California Energy Commission. Washington, D.C. and Sacramento, CA.

Cultural/Native American Stipulation: The National Historic Preservation Act (NHPA) requires that if newly discovered cultural resources are identified during project implementation, work in that area must stop and the agency Authorized Officer notified immediately (36 CFR 800.13). The Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act (NAGPRA), requires that if

inadvertent discovery of Native American Remains or Objects occurs, activity must cease in the area of discovery, a reasonable effort made to protect the item(s) discovered, and immediate notice made to the BLM Authorized Officer, as well as the appropriate Native American group(s) (IV.C.2). Notice may be followed by a 30-day delay (NAGPRA Section 3(d)). Further actions also require compliance under the provisions of NHPA and the Archaeological Resource Protection Act.

Noxious and Invasive Plant Species Stipulation: The applicant will monitor the project area for the presence of any noxious weeds and will be responsible for promptly controlling any noxious weeds on the Colorado State List A or B (except redstem filaree) within the right-of-way. If the applicant chooses to use herbicides as the control method on public lands, a Pesticide Use Proposal shall be submitted to the BLM and approved prior to initiating any herbicide spraying.

I considered this action and determined that it may be categorically excluded. I have evaluated the action relative to the 12 criteria listed above and have determined that it does not represent an exception and is, therefore, categorically excluded from further environmental analysis.
