

Archaeological Work at Lands End Reveals Early City Life

In advance of rehabilitation work around Merrie Way in spring 2008, an archaeological excavation at Lands End unearthed items that reveal glimpses of San Francisco's social and cultural fabric over 100 years ago. The artifacts—including jewelry, embossed "New Century" soda bottles, oyster shells from Washington State and the East Coast, and bones from steaks and lamp chops eaten long ago—hint at the fare around the concessionaires next to an early San Francisco "amusement park." The items are currently being inventoried at Sonoma State University and will be featured in a future exhibit. Also, trail work at nearby Ocean Terrace (see "Destination" below) was routed around areas found to be rich with historic artifacts.

Birds, Butterflies Return to Restored Crissy Field

If you build it, they will come—such was the promise of a restored tidal marsh at the Presidio's Crissy Field, and that promise has been fulfilled. Since the restoration of marsh habitat at Crissy Field starting in 2000, over 100 bird species have returned. This summer, local naturalist Liam O'Brien recorded the first-ever observation of a western pygmy blue butterfly in the Presidio at Crissy Field. The presence of this butterfly, found only in salt marsh habitat, is further testament to the success of the Crissy Field restoration and its ongoing stewardship.

Volunteer Geologist Helps the Park Explore Sea Caves

The Gulf Coast of Florida in the northwestern panhandle and the Golden Gate National Parks seem to have little in common. But upon deeper investigation, both boast pristine beaches, coastal fortifications, and now a conscientious GeoCorps volunteer geologist, Connie Garrett. Working with subject matter experts and aerial photographs of the California coastline, Garrett has located an estimated 500 sea caves along the shoreline of the Golden Gate National Recreation Area and Point Reyes National Seashore. Formerly a geologist for the Florida State Department of Health, Garrett hopes to return next fall to map these largely unexplored features of the park.



A SNAPSHOT OF A TIME AND PLACE: OCEAN TERRACE, 1889–1920

TODAY, THE SITE OF OCEAN TERRACE is a vacant street corner, across from the entrance to Sutro Heights Park and adjacent to Lands End. But around the turn of the 20th century, Ocean Terrace was host to a lively mix of restaurants, saloons, curio shops, photo galleries, and other diversions geared toward visitors headed for Sutro Baths and the Cliff House.

Adolph Sutro (1830—1898), the philanthropist turned San Francisco mayor, had a vision for a recreation district at the City's northwestern tip. Ocean Terrace, completed in 1888 as a sort of 19th-century strip mall, was part of his plan. The tiny street, located at the northwest corner of today's Point Lobos Avenue and El Camino del Mar, consisted of a two-story "commercial block" building and four smaller buildings.

Ocean Terrace was sited across the tracks from the Ferries & Cliff House train depot, where visitors debarked for Sutro's many amusements. The businesses

were clearly situated to separate passengers from their change, and the presence of five liquor establishments on a street only 250 feet long attests to the hearty drinking abilities of early-day San Franciscans.

Ocean Terrace was a working-class neighborhood typical of turn-of-the-century San Francisco. Several of the proprietors and their families lived above their shops, and most took in single male boarders for ex-

tra income. Tavern-owner Joseph Imhof held the record in 1910 when he reported 10 men living with his family as boarders. The 1900 and 1910 censuses reveal a blue-collar population that was overwhelmingly male and single. In 1900, all the adults living along Ocean Terrace were foreign-born Europeans many from Germany—and names like Rohrs, Olsen, and Schmidt are on the register of shop owners.

Around 1918, due in part to restrictions on liquor sales near Fort Miley, almost all Ocean Terrace proprietors closed their establishments. Prohibition sealed the street's fate, and by 1923 all the buildings had been demolished to make way for El Camino del Mar.



ONGOING Habitat Restoration Team Sundays (9:30 AM-2:30 PM)

The Habitat Restoration Team, established in 1988, engages community members in the management and enhancement of the Golden

Gate National Parks. Volunteers and

staff meet weekly at different scenic

locations to restore the parks' native habitat by removing invasive plants, transplanting native plants (a key winter activity), and seed collecting (spring through fall). Appropriate for adults and youth (chaperones are suggested for youth under age 18). Meeting locations vary; phone 561-4848 for locations, directions, and carpool availability.

Invasive Plant Patrol Wednesdays (10 AM-2 PM)

Wednesdays (IU AM-2 PM

The Invasive Plant Patrol hikes park trails to find new invasions of exotic plants, and removes localized infestations before they become uncontrolled. You'll learn to identify both malicious and benign plants during these hikes that last approximately four hours. Appropriate for adults and youth (chaperones are suggested for youth under age 18). Meeting locations vary, and work dates are sometimes intermittent; phone 561-4848 to register.

Site Stewardship

The Site Stewardship Program works to restore habitat for threatened and endangered species at special restoration sites in Pacifica and the Marin Headlands. Learn about local ecology and natural history while improving habitat for the mission blue butterfly, the San Francisco garter snake, the San Bruno elfin, and the California red-legged frog. We Hold the Rock


