Defense Exports — Revising Controls; Increasing Trade Opportunities

There is a growing debate within the Aerospace and Defense industry about whether the current export control system is too cumbersome, neither fully protecting against unauthorized transfer of sensitive technology nor providing the mechanisms to foster increased defense exports. The Presidential Export Control Directive of January 2008 and the Export Control Reform Act of 2008 are attempts to remedy some of the short-comings. But as many challenges remain, opportunities for defense exports are growing exponentially, with foreign military sales having tripled over the last seven years.
