6% of the time it comes with another program (Office, etc.)

The other ten percent are miscelaneous means, like got it from a friend, got it from work, etc., that are each 1 or 2%.

I still don't feel like I completely understand this market. since only 30% of internet users have ever downloaded a new browser (they use what comes with their pc or comes with their ISP sign up kit), the only real chance IE has of getting them to switch is thru a new pc, an OS upgrade or a new ISP kit.

Net net. 33% of IE users downloaded IE. Here's how the rest distributed in terms of how it was acquired:

- 25% of IE users got IE with a new PC
- 6% got it with another program (e.g. windows or office),
- 25% say it came with a subscription (most likely MSN).

Bob, here is some info. on how people get and use IE that might help you guys. My feeling, based on all the IE research we have done, is that it is mistake to release memphis without bundling IE with it.

- IE users are more likely than other browser users to get it with their computers. Overall 20% of people who use IE at home obtained it with their computer; and 24% of those using IE at work got it with their computer. Effectively we would be taking away the distribution channel of almost a quarter of all IE users.
- Overall 34% of all surfers (not just IE users) have ever downloaded a browser. That means 66% of everybody on the web has never downloaded a browser.
- Almost 60% of all surfers have never downloaded any software from the web. my sense
 is that these people are not very likely to download anything, let alone a browser that
 takes 2 hours to download, from the web
- 80% of those who do not use IE say they have no plans to switch to it. which means that
 if we take away IE from the o/s, most nav users will never switch to us.
- Also from all our research with IS and web professionals we know that they eventually
 expect us to win the browser war because le will be bundled with the operating system
 and they will have no real reason to purchase navigator.
- Also, we both saw in all our groups with end users and IS that the integration of the

browser and the operating system was a very compelling feature.
