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Heavy rains caused flash flooding to occur over much of Clay County. The towns of Piggott, Greenway, Pollard, and McDougal were especially hit hard. Highway 49 north of Greenway was completely submersed by flood waters. Water 6 inches deep covered many county roads. The city airport of Piggott was also underwater. A number of homes were also flooded. Officials estimated some 50 households were displaced by flooding. Many fall crops were devastated and heavy damage to roads and bridges also occurred across the county. 14 goats were killed by the flood waters near McDougal. Officials estimated about 22 roads were closed to flooding or bridge damage. In addition, a levee was breached along the Number Nine ditch between Pollard and Fagus

#### Randolph County

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Heavy rains caused flash flooding in northern portions of Randolph County. The hardest hit area was near Maynard where flood water entered many homes near Highway 115. Porches were ripped off from some homes due to the flood water. In addition, 8 to 12 inches of flood water covered the intersection of Highway 90 and Highway 251. Officials estimated that 70 percent of roads and highways had been damaged by flooding, and about half of the damage had been severe. Two chicken houses in North Central Randolph County were flooded, killing about 40,000 chickens. In addition, a number of cattle drowned and crops were severely damaged.

#### Lawrence County

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Heavy rains caused flash flooding along the Spring River. People had to be rescued from homes along the river. Six homes were damaged by the flood waters. Some crop damage also occurred from the flooding. Near Imboden and Ravenden, farmers reported a loss more than 500 bales of hay due to rising waters. In addition, more than 150 head of cattle were killed by flood waters. Some farm equipment, vehicles, and campers was also damaged from flood water or swept away by the rising flood waters. Black Rock was also especially hit hard by the flooding

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A tornado crossed Wirth Road on the Sharp/Randolph County line. The tornado tracked northeast for about a mile into Randolph County and lifted up before reaching Upper Janes Creek Road. The tornado only produced some damage to trees in the area. No residences or other buildings were in the path of the tornado.

One house had its front porch torn off. Several other homes and barns suffered roof damage. Several trees were knocked down, some of which fell on homes.
