



## **Indiana**

### **Demographics**

- Population (2006 American Community Survey): 6,313,520<sup>1</sup>

### **Programs/Initiatives**

- High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area (HIDTA)<sup>10</sup>  
Designated in 1996, the Lake County HIDTA is responsible for all of Lake County, which contains 19 incorporated cities and towns and 16 public school corporations.
- Meth Free Indiana Coalition<sup>11</sup>  
The Meth Free Indiana Coalition was formed in early 2005 in response to the passage of the Meth Protection Act (SEA 444), a legislative initiative to slow the destruction of methamphetamine in Indiana communities.
- Governor's Commission for a Drug-Free Indiana<sup>12</sup>  
The Governor's Commission for a Drug-Free Indiana was created in 1989 to develop a comprehensive statewide approach to alcohol and other drug problems. The Commission assists local communities in the development of community plans to address substance abuse issues.
- Indiana Prevention Resource Center (IPRC)<sup>13</sup>  
IPRC is a statewide clearinghouse for prevention, technical assistance, and information about alcohol, tobacco, and other drugs for Indiana. It is also Indiana's officially designated RADAR (Regional Alcohol and Drug Awareness Resource) Network State Center.
- Prenatal Substance Use Prevention Program (PSUPP)<sup>14</sup>  
PSUPP was created in 1984 to prevent and eliminate substance abuse among pregnant women before they need intensive treatment. PSUPP educates and counsels chemically dependent pregnant women about addiction, promotes abstinence, and refers women to treatment services.

### **Crime and Drug-Related Crime**

- During 2006, the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) made 422 arrests for drug violations in Indiana.<sup>15</sup>

## Drugs

- Cocaine<sup>18</sup>  
Powder cocaine is readily available throughout the state, while crack cocaine is primarily available in the urban areas of Indiana.
- Heroin<sup>19</sup>  
Heroin is not readily available in central or southern Indiana. In northern Indiana, Southeast Asian white heroin has decreased and has been replaced by Mexican brown and black tar heroin.
- Marijuana<sup>20</sup>  
The abuse of marijuana remains a significant problem within Indiana.
- Methamphetamine<sup>21</sup>  
The influx of methamphetamine into Indiana has been increasing. Mexican organizations are noted for cutting the product two or three times before distribution, while local methamphetamine distributors operating small toxic labs sell a better quality product with a purity of 30 to 40 percent. However, these organizations do not produce large enough quantities to support wholesale distribution.
- Club Drugs<sup>22</sup>  
The abuse of club drugs is not reported to be a significant problem in Indiana.
- Diverted Pharmaceuticals<sup>23</sup>  
OxyContin continues to be a threat in Indiana. Hydrocodone and benzodiazepines remain the primary pharmaceutical drugs of abuse throughout the state. In 2004, Indiana expanded their prescription-monitoring program to include pharmaceutical controlled substances in Schedules II through V.
- According to 2004-2005 data from the National Survey on Drug Use and Health (NSDUH), approximately 378,000 (7%) of Indiana citizens (ages 12 or older) reported past month use of an illicit drug.<sup>24</sup>

- Approximately 2 million (39.6%) Indiana citizens reported that using marijuana occasionally (once a month) was a “great risk”.<sup>25</sup>

- Additional 2004-2005 NSDUH results indicate that 148,000 (3.89%) Indiana citizens reported illicit drug dependence or abuse within the past year. Approximately 103,000 (2%) reported past year illicit drug dependence.<sup>26</sup>

### **Juveniles**

- A survey of Indiana youth in 2007 revealed that more than 10% of 8<sup>th</sup>, 9<sup>th</sup>, 10<sup>th</sup>, 11<sup>th</sup> and 12<sup>th</sup> graders reported abusing over-the-counter (OTC) medications at least once in their lives.<sup>27</sup>

### Enforcement

- As of October 31, 2006, there were 15,934 full-time law enforcement employees in Indiana (10,197 officers and 5,737 civilians).<sup>31</sup>

### Trafficking and Seizures

- Indiana is an active drug transportation and distribution area. Highway (automobile and trucking) and airline trafficking are the primary means of drug importation, with busing systems as a secondary means.<sup>32</sup>
- Mexican criminal groups are the primary wholesale distributors of marijuana, powdered cocaine and methamphetamine within Indiana.<sup>33</sup>
- Methamphetamine is manufactured in Mexico or the southwestern states and transported into Indiana. Mexican trafficking organizations are transporting 15 to 25 pounds at a time with a purity level ranging from 25 to 85 percent.<sup>34</sup>
- Federal agencies in Indiana reported seizing 382.4 kilograms of marijuana during 2006.<sup>35</sup>

- During 2006, there were 737 methamphetamine laboratory incidents in Indiana reported by the DEA and state and local authorities.<sup>36</sup>

- During 2006, more than 25,000 cultivated marijuana plants were eradicated in Indiana as part of the DEA's Domestic Cannabis Eradication/Suppression Program.<sup>37</sup>

### Courts

- Drug Courts<sup>38</sup>  
As of April 16, 2007, there were 37 drug courts in existence or being planned in Indiana. Twenty-three drug courts had been operating for at least two years, 5 had recently been implemented and another 9 were being planned at that time.
- During FY 2006, 37.8% of the Federally sentenced defendants in Indiana had committed a drug offense. More than 30% of these drug offenses involved crack cocaine.<sup>39</sup>

### Corrections

- As of October 31, 2007, there were 24,706 adult male inmates within the Indiana Department of Correction (DOC).<sup>40</sup>

- As of January 1, 2007, 23.3% of adult and 6.2% of juvenile offenders were incarcerated/detained for controlled substance offenses (as their most serious offense committed).<sup>41</sup>

### Consequences of Use

- There were 144 children affected by methamphetamine laboratories in Indiana during 2006.<sup>42</sup>
- It is estimated that 10% of all reported HIV transmissions and 11% of all AIDS cases in Indiana are attributable to injection drug use.<sup>43</sup>

## Treatment

- During 2006, there were 37,080 admissions to drug/alcohol treatment in Indiana.<sup>44</sup>  
There were 37,471 such treatment admissions during 2005.<sup>45</sup> In 2004, there were 37,707 admissions to drug/alcohol treatment in the state.<sup>46</sup>

- According to 2004-2005 NSDUH data, approximately 133,000 (2.59%) Indiana citizens reported needing but not receiving treatment for illicit drug use within the past year.<sup>47</sup>
