## **West Virginia**

The following profile contains information on demographics, political figures, programs, crime, drug use, drug trafficking and enforcement.

### **Demographics**

### **Programs/Initiatives**

- High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area (HIDTA)<sup>10</sup>  
Designated in 1998, the Appalachia HIDTA is responsible for counties in Kentucky, Tennessee, and the following counties in West Virginia: Boone, Braxton, Cabell, Gilmer, Kanawha, Lewis, Lincoln, Logan, Mason, McDowell, Mingo and Wayne.
- CREATE for a Drug-Free West Virginia<sup>11</sup>  
The mission of this program is to promote the health and well-being of the citizens of West Virginia. In addition, this program aims at eliminating the unhealthy or illicit use of tobacco, alcohol, and other drugs among youth and adults.

### **Crime and Drug-Related Crime**

- During 2007, the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) reported 113 arrests for drug violations in West Virginia.<sup>12</sup>

- There were 4,100 state and local arrests for drug abuse violations in West Virginia during 2006.<sup>13</sup>

## Drugs

- Cocaine<sup>14</sup>  
Cocaine hydrochloride and crack cocaine are widely available in most West Virginia cities. Crack cocaine abuse generally remains confined to lower income individuals, although its abuse crosses all ethnic lines. Rural communities have been drastically affected by crack distribution and its accompanying violence. Cocaine availability is limited to large-retail or small-wholesale quantities.
- Heroin<sup>15</sup>  
Heroin demand and availability are limited throughout West Virginia. Small groups of long-term heroin addicts exist and rely on each other to obtain heroin from secondary sources in Philadelphia and Baltimore.
- Marijuana<sup>16</sup>  
Marijuana consumption and cultivation is considered a serious drug threat throughout West Virginia. The state consistently ranks among the top ten states for marijuana eradication.
- Methamphetamine<sup>17</sup>  
Methamphetamine is one of the most pronounced drug threats in West Virginia.
- Club Drugs<sup>18</sup>  
Demand for MDMA in West Virginia has increased, although its abuse remains concentrated near Morgantown, which is the location of West Virginia University. The state's remote terrain also makes it suitable to host rave parties, although attendance at large-scale, publicized raves has been disappointing to promoters.
- Diverted Pharmaceuticals<sup>19</sup>  
Pharmaceutical drug abuse is among the most serious drug threats in West Virginia. Current investigations indicate that diversion of hydrocodone products and diazepam continues to be a problem in the state.
- According to 2005-2006 data from the National Survey on Drug Use and Health (NSDUH), approximately 123,000 (8%) West Virginia citizens (ages 12 or older) reported past month use of an illicit drug.<sup>20</sup>

- Approximately 691,000 (44.75%) West Virginia citizens reported that using marijuana occasionally (once a month) was a “great risk”.<sup>21</sup>
- Additional 2005-2006 NSDUH results indicate that 45,000 (2.90%) West Virginia citizens reported illicit drug dependence or abuse within the past year. Approximately 29,000 (1.87%) reported past year illicit drug dependence.<sup>22</sup>

### Juveniles

- Results of a 2005 survey of West Virginia high school students indicate that approximately 39% reported trying marijuana at least once in their lifetime.<sup>23</sup>

- Approximately 44% of West Virginia 12th graders surveyed in 2005 reported using marijuana at least once during their lifetime.<sup>24</sup>

- Approximately 4.9% of West Virginia students surveyed in 2005 reported using marijuana on school property at least once within the past month.<sup>25</sup>
- According to 2005-2006 NSDUH data, approximately 10% of West Virginia 12-17 year olds reported past month use of an illicit drug.<sup>26</sup>

#### Enforcement

- As of October 31, 2006, there were 4,208 full-time law enforcement employees in West Virginia (3,333 officers and 875 civilians).<sup>27</sup>
- Drug Identification Section<sup>28</sup>  
The Drug Identification Section of the West Virginia State Police analyzes and identifies any suspected controlled substances submitted to the crime lab.

#### Trafficking and Seizures

- Drug distributors in West Virginia are uniquely placed to take advantage of sources of supply from both nearby eastern cities, including Baltimore, Pittsburgh, and Washington, DC, and large mid-western cities, such as Columbus and Detroit.<sup>29</sup>
- Clandestine methamphetamine laboratory activity in West Virginia decreased because of state and Federal laws regulating the sale of precursor chemicals. In the past, methamphetamine manufacturing was believed to be primarily focused in the Panhandle region of the state, but has since expanded to include other areas of northern West Virginia as well as some southeastern sites.<sup>30</sup>
- During 2007, there were 40 methamphetamine laboratory incidents in West Virginia reported by the DEA and state and local authorities, down from 213 incidents reported during 2005.<sup>31</sup>

- Approximately 5.7 kilograms of cocaine were seized by Federal agencies in West Virginia during 2007.<sup>32</sup>

- During 2006, more than 57,000 cultivated marijuana plants were eradicated in West Virginia under the DEA's Domestic Cannabis Eradication/Suppression Program.<sup>33</sup>

#### Courts

- Drug Courts<sup>34</sup>  
As of April 16, 2007, there were 5 drug courts in existence or being planned in West Virginia. One drug court had been in existence for at least two years, 2 had been recently implemented and 2 were being planned.
- During FY 2006, 62.5% of the Federally-sentenced defendants in West Virginia committed a drug offense. More than half of the drug cases involved crack cocaine.<sup>35</sup>

#### Corrections

- According to the West Virginia Division of Corrections (DOC), as of June 30, 2007, there were 4,647 prisoners incarcerated in West Virginia.<sup>36</sup>
- As of June 30, 2007, there were 646 inmates incarcerated in West Virginia DOC facilities for drug-related crimes, representing approximately 11% of the DOC inmates.<sup>37</sup>

- The West Virginia DOC Parole Services had 2,170 offenders under supervision on June 30, 2007. The DOC Parole Services population includes West Virginia parolees, out-of-state parolees, and out-of-state probationers. Approximately 25% of the DOC Parole Services clients were charged with drug offenses.<sup>38</sup>

#### Consequences of Use

- According to the El Paso Intelligence Center, there were 9 children in West Virginia affected by methamphetamine laboratories during 2007.<sup>39</sup>

#### Treatment

- During 2006, there were 7,642 admissions to drug/alcohol treatment in West Virginia.<sup>40</sup> There were 6,383 admissions to treatment in 2005.<sup>41</sup>

- According to 2005-2006 NSDUH data, approximately 42,000 (2.69%) West Virginia citizens reported needing but not receiving treatment for illicit drug use within the past year.<sup>42</sup>
