### **Programs and Initiatives**

- High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area (HIDTA)
  - Northern California HIDTA: designated in 1997; responsible for Alameda, Contra Costa, Lake, Marin, Monterey, San Francisco, San Mateo, Santa Clara, Santa Cruz and Sonoma counties<sup>10</sup>
  - Central Valley HIDTA: designated in 1999; responsible for Fresno, Kern, Kings, Madera, Merced, Sacramento, San Joaquin, Stanislaus and Tulare counties<sup>11</sup>
  - Los Angeles HIDTA: designated in 1990; responsible for Los Angeles, Orange, Riverside and San Bernardino counties<sup>12</sup>
  - Southwest Border HIDTA/California Region (“California Border Alliance Group”): designated in 1990; responsible for San Diego and Imperial counties<sup>13</sup>

- California Access to Recovery Effort (CARE)<sup>14</sup>  
Funded by the Federal Access to Recovery (ATR) program, this initiative allows people in need of substance abuse treatment to make individual choices for recovery that reflect their personal values. The CARE program serves youth between 12 through 20 years of age residing in Los Angeles, Sacramento, Butte, Shasta and Tehama counties.

**Crime and Drug-Related Crime**

- The Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) made 3,055 drug arrests in California during 2007.<sup>15</sup>
- During 2006, there were 2,483 homicides reported in California.<sup>16</sup>

- There were 6,088 juvenile and 153,856 adult felony arrests for drug offenses in California during 2005.<sup>17</sup>

- There were 147,301 misdemeanor arrests for drug offenses in California during 2005.<sup>18</sup>

**Drugs**

- Cocaine<sup>19</sup>  
Cocaine is readily available throughout the state with Los Angeles remaining one of the nation’s largest cocaine transshipment and distribution centers. Cocaine is also widely available in San Francisco and other areas of northern California.
- Heroin<sup>20</sup>  
The increased availability of high purity heroin that can be snorted allows a new, younger population to use heroin without a needle.

- **Marijuana<sup>21</sup>**  
Marijuana remains the most widely available and abused illicit substance in California.
- **Methamphetamine<sup>22</sup>**  
Methamphetamine is the primary drug threat in California. Within the state, Hispanics and Caucasians are the almost exclusive consumers of meth. Purity levels of meth have ranged from a low of 10% to a high of 100% pure.
- **Club Drugs<sup>23</sup>**  
Although ecstasy (MDMA) was considered the most popular club drug in the state among teens and young adults, there are indicators that its use may be decreasing across the board, although the drug remains consistently available in geographical pockets. Recent studies indicate that use of MDMA is expanding from raves and clubs into schools, malls and private residences.
- **Diverted Pharmaceuticals<sup>24</sup>**  
Current investigations indicate that the diversion of hydrocodone products, such as Vicodin, and oxycodone products, such as OxyContin, continues to be a problem in California.
- According to 2004-2005 data from the National Survey on Drug Use and Health (NSDUH), approximately 2.6 million (9%) California citizens (ages 12 or older) reported past month use of an illicit drug.<sup>25</sup>

- Approximately 11.2 million (38.46%) California citizens reported that using marijuana occasionally (once a month) was a “great risk”.<sup>26</sup>
- Additional 2004-2005 NSDUH results indicate that 880,000 (3.02%) California citizens reported illicit drug dependence or abuse within the past year. Approximately 618,000 (2.12%) reported past year illicit drug dependence.<sup>27</sup>

**Juveniles**

- According to 2004-2005 NSDUH data, approximately 348,000 (11%) California 12-17 year olds reported past month use of an illicit drug.<sup>28</sup>

- During the 2005-2006 school year, approximately 45% of California 11th graders surveyed reported lifetime abuse of an illegal drug.<sup>29</sup>

- During the 2005-2006 school year, approximately 19% of California 11th graders surveyed reported current (past month) use of marijuana.<sup>30</sup>

**Enforcement**

- As of October 2006, there were 115,912 full-time law enforcement employees in California (75,483 officers and 40,429 civilians).<sup>31</sup>
- California Bureau of Narcotic Enforcement (BNE)<sup>32</sup>  
Established in 1927, BNE is the oldest narcotic enforcement bureau in the United States. BNE programs target major drug dealers, violent career criminals, clandestine drug manufacturers and violators of prescription drug laws.

## Trafficking and Seizures

- Mexican trafficking organizations, working closely with Colombian suppliers, dominate the wholesale cocaine trade in California.<sup>33</sup>
- The majority of the cocaine destined for the U.S. enters the country by land conveyance through ports of entry along the California/Mexico border.<sup>34</sup>
- Cocaine bought by gangs in the Los Angeles area is converted into crack cocaine and then sold locally or distributed to other cities in California and nationally. These organizations frequently use intimidation and violence to facilitate their narcotics trafficking activities.<sup>35</sup>
- Mexican organizations continue to dominate the production and distribution of high-quality methamphetamine in the state, while a secondary trafficking group, composed primarily of Caucasians, operates small, unsophisticated laboratories.<sup>36</sup>
- As the supply of pseudoephedrine from Canada has diminished after successful law enforcement operations, there has been a noticeable increase in pseudoephedrine and ephedrine seized that originates in China.<sup>37</sup>
- More than 10,000 kilograms of cocaine were seized by Federal agencies in California during 2007.<sup>38</sup>

- More than 400 pounds of methamphetamine were seized by the California Bureau of Narcotic Enforcement during 2006.<sup>39</sup>

- During 2007, there were 221 methamphetamine laboratory incidents in California reported by the DEA and state and local authorities, a decrease from the 1,281 such incidents reported during 2003.<sup>40</sup>

- During 2006, nearly 3 million cultivated marijuana plants were eradicated and seized in California as part of the DEA's Domestic Cannabis Eradication/Suppression Program.<sup>41</sup>

**Courts**

- Drug Courts<sup>42</sup>  
As of April 16, 2007, there were 155 drug courts in California that had operating for at least two years, 6 that had recently been implemented and 10 that were being planned.
- During FY 2006, 30.4% of the Federally-sentenced defendants in California committed a drug offense. Approximately 44% of these drug cases involved marijuana.<sup>43</sup>

- Approximately 44% of the adult felony drug offenders sentenced in California during 2005 received a sentence of probation with jail time.<sup>44</sup>

**Corrections**

- The California Department of Corrections (CDC) institutional population was 170,133 on February 20, 2008. The CDC parole population on that date was 127,314.<sup>45</sup>
- On June 30, 2007, the offender population in California institutions was 173,274. Approximately 21% of the offenders at that time had committed drug offenses.<sup>46</sup>

- Approximately 8.5% of the total offenders in CDC institutions on June 30, 2007 had committed a controlled substance (CS) possession offense.<sup>47</sup>

- As of December 31, 2007, the California parole population was 127,015. Approximately 31% of the parolees had committed drug offenses.<sup>48</sup>

**Consequences of Use**

- According to the El Paso Intelligence Center, there were 64 children in California affected by methamphetamine laboratories during 2007.<sup>50</sup>

**Treatment**

- During 2006, there were 193,717 drug/alcohol treatment admissions in California.<sup>51</sup> There were 183,278 treatment admissions in California during 2005.<sup>52</sup> More than one-third of these treatment admissions were related to amphetamines, during both 2005<sup>53</sup> and 2006.<sup>54</sup>

- According to 2004-2005 NSDUH data, approximately 849,000 (2.92%) California citizens reported needing but not receiving treatment for illicit drug use within the past year.<sup>55</sup>
