



## Wyoming

The following profile contains information on demographics, political figures, programs, crime, drug use, drug trafficking and enforcement statistics.

### **Demographics**

- Population (2006 American Community Survey): 515,004<sup>1</sup>
- Race/Ethnicity (2006 American Community Survey): 91.8% white; 0.7% black/African American; 2.2% American Indian/Alaska Native; 0.9% Asian; 0.1% Native Hawaiian/other Pacific Islander; 2.4% other; 1.8% two or more races; 6.9% Hispanic/Latino origin (of any race)<sup>2</sup>

### **Programs/Initiatives**

- High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area (HIDTA)<sup>9</sup>  
Designated in 1996, the Rocky Mountain HIDTA is responsible for areas of Colorado, Utah and Wyoming. The following Wyoming counties participate in Rocky Mountain HIDTA efforts: Albany, Campbell, Laramie, Natrona, Sweetwater and Uinta.
- Meth Kills Wyoming<sup>10</sup>  
This Web site is an interactive source of information about methamphetamine, its effects, how to get help and how to get involved at the community level. Ads that have been created as part of the Meth Kills Wyoming initiative and personal stories can be viewed on the site.

### **Crime and Drug-Related Crime**

- During 2006, the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) reported 121 arrests for drug violations in Wyoming, an increase from the 62 arrests reported during 2005.<sup>11</sup>

- During 2006, there were 2 juvenile and 4 adult arrests for murder/non-negligent manslaughter in Wyoming.<sup>12</sup>

- There were 502 juvenile and 2,615 adult arrests for drug violations in Wyoming during 2006.<sup>13</sup>

- The Wyoming Division of Criminal Investigation (DCI) made 460 methamphetamine-related arrests during 2006.<sup>14</sup>

## Drugs

- Cocaine<sup>15</sup>

Wyoming cocaine prices have remained stable, but demand for the drug has declined in recent years. Crack cocaine can be found in the state, but not in significant quantities.

- Heroin<sup>16</sup>  
While it does not present a significant law enforcement problem in Wyoming, Mexican heroin is available. Most of the heroin found in Wyoming comes from sources in Utah.
- Methamphetamine<sup>17</sup>  
In recent years, methamphetamine has emerged as the illicit drug of choice in Wyoming and is the most significant drug threat in the state. Methamphetamine abuse is of great concern to Wyoming law enforcement due to its correlation with violent crime, domestic violence and child abuse.
- Marijuana<sup>18</sup>  
Marijuana is widely abused in Wyoming. Most of the marijuana encountered is of Mexican origin, although higher potency marijuana from British Columbia, Canada, can be found as well.
- Club Drugs<sup>19</sup>  
Club drugs such as GHB and MDMA can be found in Wyoming, and most come from sources of supply in Colorado. Although not as popular, LSD and psilocybin mushrooms are popular recreational drugs on college campuses.
- Diverted Pharmaceuticals<sup>20</sup>  
The diversion of prescription controlled substances is a concern in Wyoming. Valium (a benzodiazepine) and semi-synthetic narcotic painkillers (such as Vicodin, Dilaudid and Percocet/Percodan) have been identified as being among the most commonly abused and diverted pharmaceuticals in Wyoming.
- According to 2004-2005 data from the National Survey on Drug Use and Health (NSDUH), approximately 32,000 (8%) of Wyoming citizens (ages 12 or older) reported past month use of an illicit drug.<sup>21</sup>

- Approximately 157,000 (36.9%) Wyoming citizens reported that using marijuana occasionally (once a month) was a “great risk”.<sup>22</sup>
- Additional 2004-2005 NSDUH results indicate that 12,000 (2.93%) Wyoming citizens reported illicit drug dependence or abuse within the past year. Approximately 8,000 (1.94%) reported past year illicit drug dependence.<sup>23</sup>

#### Juveniles

- During 2005, 8.5% of high school students in Wyoming reported using methamphetamine within their lifetime.<sup>24</sup>

- Approximately 46% of Wyoming 12th graders surveyed in 2005 reported using marijuana at least once during their lifetime.<sup>25</sup>

- According to 2004-2005 NSDUH data, approximately 10% of Wyoming 12-17 year olds reported past month use of an illicit drug.<sup>26</sup>

## **Enforcement**

- As of October 31, 2006, there were 1,989 full-time law enforcement employees in Wyoming (1,239 officers and 750 civilians).<sup>27</sup>

## **Trafficking and Seizures**

- Mexican poly-drug trafficking organizations dominate the distribution of methamphetamine, cocaine and marijuana in Wyoming. Local traffickers are supplied by distributors in Colorado, the Southwest Border states and Mexico.<sup>28</sup>
- During 2006, 129 marijuana plants were eradicated in Wyoming under the DEA's Domestic Cannabis Eradication/Suppression Program.<sup>29</sup>

- During 2006, the Wyoming Division of Criminal Investigation (DCI) seized 230,356 grams of marijuana and the Wyoming Highway Patrol (WHP) seized 253,119 grams of marijuana.<sup>30</sup>

- During 2006, Federal authorities seized 8.6 kilograms of methamphetamine in Wyoming.<sup>31</sup>

- During 2006, there were 3 methamphetamine laboratory incidents reported by DEA and state and local authorities in Wyoming.<sup>32</sup>

#### Courts

- Drug Courts<sup>33</sup>

As of April 16, 2007, there were 20 drug courts in Wyoming that had been operating for at least two years, 3 that had recently been implemented and 2 that were being planned.

- During FY 2006, 45.3% of Federally sentenced defendants in Wyoming had committed drug offenses. More than half (52.4%) of these drug offenses involved methamphetamine.<sup>34</sup>

#### Corrections

- At yearend 2006, there were 2,114 prisoners under the jurisdiction of state or Federal correctional authorities in Wyoming.<sup>35</sup>
- At yearend 2006, there were 5,225 adults on probation and 674 adults on parole in Wyoming.<sup>36</sup>

#### Consequences of Use

- In 2005 there were 2 Wyoming methamphetamine laboratory sites reported to the El Paso Intelligence Center in which a child was present.<sup>37</sup>

#### Treatment

- During 2006, there were 5,354 admissions to drug/alcohol treatment in Wyoming.<sup>38</sup> There were 6,362 such treatment admissions in Wyoming during 2005.<sup>39</sup> The number of treatment admissions during 2004 was 5,665.<sup>40</sup>

- According to 2004-2005 NSDUH data, approximately 11,000 (2.56%) Wyoming citizens reported needing but not receiving treatment for illicit drug use within the past year.<sup>41</sup>
