The Purpose of the Compassion Capital Fund

To build the capacity of faith-based and community organizations

Capacity building is the process of implementing activities critical to the long-term viability of organizations to increase the effectiveness of programmatic activities and organizational operations.



What is Capacity Building?

The goal of capacity building is to increase organizational infrastructure and bolster sustainability, ultimately enabling the organization to serve more people more effectively.



Critical Areas of Capacity Building

CCF-funded activities must address at least one of the five critical areas of capacity building:

- 1) leadership development,
- 2) organizational development,
- 3) program development,
- 4) revenue development strategies, or
- 5) community engagement.



What CCF Funds Cannot be Used For

- Inherently religious activities, such as worship, religious instruction, or proselytization
- Direct Services
- Direct Fundraising
- Medical / Healthcare related activities
- International Programs / Activities



Overview of the Compassion Capital Fund

There are 3 separate programs that make up the Compassion Capital Fund:

- The Intermediary Demonstration Program
- The Communities Empowering Youth (CEY) Program
- The Targeted Capacity Building (Minigrant) Program



Overview of the Compassion Capital FundThe Demonstration Program

The Demonstration (Intermediary) Program

 CCF awards grants to intermediary organizations that serve as a bridge between the Federal government and FBCOs. The intermediary organizations then provide the FBCOs with 1) training and technical assistance and 2) competitive, capacity-building sub-awards.



CCF Intermediary Demonstration ProgramProgram Design



The Intermediary Demonstration Program – Overview

- Ceiling on Individual Awards:
 - \$500,000 per 12-month budget period
 - \$1,500,000 over 3 years
- Project Period: 36 months with three 12-month budget periods
- Non-Federal Match: 20 percent of the total approved cost of the project
- Eligibility:
 - Governments: state, county, city, township, or special district
 - Institutions of higher education
 - Indian/Native American Tribal governments
 - Non-profits with or without 501(c)(3) IRS status




Communities Empowering Youth Program – Overview

The Communities Empowering Youth Program

- CCF awards grants to a lead organization that represents a community collaboration of partner organizations working to address at least one of the following: gang activity, youth violence, or child abuse and neglect.
- Grantees assist their collaborating faith-based and community organization partners through training, technical assistance, and financial assistance.



Communities Empowering Youth Program – Program Design





Communities Empowering Youth Program – Overview

- Ceiling on Individual Awards:
 - \$250,000 per 12 month budget period
 - \$750,000 over 36 months
- Project Period: 36 months with three 12-month budget periods
- Eligibility:
 - Non-profits with or without 501(c)(3) IRS status
 - For-profit organizations and small businesses
 - Indian/Native American Tribal governments and organizations
 - Institutions of higher education




The Targeted Capacity Building Program - Overview

The Targeted Capacity Building Program

 CCF awards grants directly to grassroots faithbased and community organizations serving distressed communities. These grassroots organizations use the funds toward building their organization's capacity in one of four social service priority areas of need: at-risk youth, homelessness, healthy marriage, or rural communities.



The Targeted Capacity Building Program – Program Design





The Targeted Capacity Building Program – Overview

- Ceiling on Individual Awards: \$50,000
- Project Period: A single 12-month period
- Eligibility:
 - Non-profits with or without 501(c)(3) status with the IRS (other than institutions of higher education)
 - Indian/Native American Tribal governments


