Conducting Focus Group Research. This booklet provides an understanding of focus groups and when they are appropriate to use and for what purposes a focus group makes sense. Additionally, the client is provided with clear direction regarding a process for designing a focus group research project. These include: documenting research objectives; selecting the right methodology; designing the research; and planning and logistics, along with preparing the discussion guide. Information is also provided on conducting the focus group, including moderation skills, as well as how to analyze focus group results.

Conducting Classroom Observations. This guide is designed for use by individuals who will be involved in the observation of classrooms, including administrators, teachers, and evaluators. This booklet provides an overview of general strategies and approaches that may be used to observe instruction. This document is organized as a series of steps that guide you through the classroom observation process. These steps include: determining your purpose, selecting a method, selecting a protocol, planning an logistics, and conducting observations, analyzing the results, and reporting the findings. It will provide practical advice to help you understand classroom practice.
