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Assistant U.S. Attorney Assigned to Each Case

FEDERAL GRAND JURY RETURNS FIVE GUN INDICTMENTS

Madison, Wisconsin -- A federal grand jury in the Western District of Wisconsin , sitting in Madison, returned the following indictments yesterday. You are advised that a charge is merely an accusation and that a defendant is presumed innocent until and unless proven guilty.

CHETEK MAN CHARGED WITH DRUG AND GUN CRIMES

Bernardo Garcia, DOB 6/13/1973, of Chetek, Wisconsin, was charged with possessing pseudoephedrine knowing that it would be used to manufacture methamphetamine; possessing equipment, chemicals, and materials knowing they would be used in the manufacture of methamphetamine; and being a felon in possession of a firearm. The firearm was a 12 gauge shotgun. If convicted, Garcia faces a maximum penalty of 20 years in prison on the possession of pseudoephedrine count, and 10 years on each of the other two counts.

This matter was investigated by the Barron County Sheriff's Department, the Polk County Sheriff's Department, and the Wisconsin Department of Justice, Division of Criminal Investigation-Narcotics Bureau. The prosecution of this case has been assigned to Assistant U.S. Attorney David J. Reinhard.

MADISON MAN CHARGED WITH GUN CRIME

Robert Seymour, DOB 4/25/1986, of Madison, Wisconsin, was charged with being a felon in possession of a firearm and ammunition. The indictment alleges that Seymour possessed a .22 caliber revolver and .22 caliber ammunition. If convicted, Seymour faces a maximum penalty of 10 years in prison.

This matter was investigated by the Madison Police Department and the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives. The prosecution of this case has been assigned to Assistant U.S. Attorney Rita M. Rumbelow.

SUPERIOR MAN CHARGED WITH GUN CRIME

Antonio Carlos Boyd, DOB 7/17/1979, of Superior, Wisconsin, was charged with being a felon in possession of a firearm and ammunition. The firearm was a .38 caliber revolver and the ammunition was .38 caliber special cartridges. If convicted, Boyd faces a maximum penalty of 10 years in prison. The investigation of this matter was conducted by the Superior Police Department. The prosecution of this case has been assigned to Assistant U.S. Attorney Daniel J. Graber.

MADISON MAN CHARGED AFTER FIREARM FOUND IN VEHICLE

Alvin Torry, DOB 11/3/1980, of Madison, Wisconsin, was charged with being a felon in possession of a firearm. If convicted, Torry faces a maximum penalty of 10 years in prison. Torry was arrested by Madison police officers on October 19, 2005, after being stopped for driving without a valid driver's license. A search of his vehicle incident to the arrest revealed a loaded .22 caliber pistol in the glove box. A complaint was filed in U.S. District Court on October 20, and Torry was held in custody following a detention hearing on October 24. The arraignment will be held on November 1, at 10:15 a.m. The investigation of the matter was conducted by the Madison Police Department and the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives. The prosecution of this matter has been assigned to Assistant U.S. Attorney Rita M. Rumbelow.

MADISON MAN CHARGED WITH TWO FIREARMS OFFENSES

Reggie Golden, DOB 5/23/1984, of 2317 Carling Drive, Madison, Wisconsin, was charged in a superseding indictment with two firearms offenses. Golden had been charged with being a felon in possession of ammunition on or about July 5, 2005 in an indictment returned by the grand jury on August 24, 2005. The superseding indictment returned yesterday also charges him with being a felon in possession of a firearm on or about September 3, 2005. The firearm was a 9mm pistol. This matter has been investigated by the Madison Police Department and the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives. The prosecution of this matter has been assigned to Assistant U.S. Attorney Rita M. Rumbelow.

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
