UNGVARI was served, by SA at her apartment doorway at 8:45 pm in the presence of the other above referenced individuals, with a Grand Jury subpoena for the United States District Court, District of Columbia, for an appearance date of March 19, 1998. UNGVARI stated she was willing to be interviewed regarding the MONICA LEWINSKY matter, but requested the interview be conducted on the sidewalk in front of her apartment building rather than in her apartment. DEPUTY BOOG then departed the scene, after which UNGVARI voluntarily provided the following information while standing in front of her apartment building in the presence of her boyfriend:

UNGVARI confirmed she was acquainted with MONICA LEWINSKY and advised the most recent contact she had with LEWINSKY occurred the day after New Years day of 1998, when LEWINSKY telephonically contacted her. UNGVARI further stated LEWINSKY had told her that LEWINSKY and PRESIDENT CLINTON were friends. At that point in the interview, UNGVARI stated she did not wish to answer any additional questions and, as a result, the interview was terminated.

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UNGVARI does not recall any of LEWINSKY's boyfriends from college.

UNGVARI visited LEWINSKY twice while LEWINSKY was working in Washington, DC. The first visit occurred in October of 1995 when LEWINSKY was an intern at the White House. UNGVARI stayed with LEWINSKY at LEWINSKY's apartment. LEWINSKY lived with her mother and brother at the time. UNGVARI visited LEWINSKY at work and met some of her co-workers. UNGVARI does not remember any names of those co-workers.

On UNGVARI's birthday, November 23, 1995, LEWINSKY telephoned and advised she had kissed CLINTON. UNGVARI understood the kiss to be more than a friendly one. UNGVARI advised that LEWINSKY would not have bothered to tell her if the kiss was just a friendly one. UNGVARI recalls LEWINSKY saying the kiss happened in or near CLINTON's office or an office within an office. LEWINSKY told UNGVARI not to tell anyone, but UNGVARI told her then-boyfriend, ROGER CROOKS and her sister, EVELYN UNGVARI. UNGVARI believed LEWINSKY since, to the best of UNGVARI's knowledge, LEWINSKY had never lied to UNGVARI about anything.

UNGVARI recalls LEWINSKY mentioning something about giving CLINTON a piece of pizza, but UNGVARI is unsure if that was the same incident as the first kiss or not.

Soon after November of 1995, LEWINSKY advised she had given CLINTON oral sex. LEWINSKY advised that she took off her clothes during this encounter. LEWINSKY mentioned that the oral sex took place in an office or a study. LEWINSKY mentioned that there was a sink in the room. LEWINSKY mentioned that CLINTON did not ejaculate. LEWINSKY expressed disappointment that CLINTON never ejaculated, but she never mentioned why CLINTON did not ejaculate. Sometime later in LEWINSKY's relationship with CLINTON, CLINTON did ejaculate and LEWINSKY expressed excitement over this fact to UNGVARI.

UNGVARI was shocked when LEWINSKY informed her of this incident. UNGVARI advised that LEWINSKY would be happy when she got to see CLINTON and depressed and unhappy when she did not. LEWINSKY advised that CLINTON told her early in their

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UNGVARI advised the sexual relationship between CLINTON and LEWINSKY lasted from the end of 1995 until sometime in 1997. UNGVARI projected a disinterest in hearing about the relationship because it was "crazy" and because UNGVARI thought LEWINSKY was playing with fire. UNGVARI advised that LEWINSKY's relationship with men appeared to follow the same pattern. LEWINSKY repeatedly became involved with men who were either married or, in some other way, unobtainable.

LEWINSKY told her mother, MARCIA LEWIS, about her relationship with CLINTON. LEWINSKY told CATHERINE ALLDAY, NEYSA ERBLAND, ASHLEY RAINES, ANDY BLEILER and BLEILER's wife about her relationship with CLINTON. LEWINSKY's meetings with CLINTON were inconsistent. Sometimes LEWINSKY met with CLINTON twice a week, sometimes once in two months.

LEWINSKY's interaction with CLINTON was orchestrated through BETTY CURRIE. LEWINSKY expressed fondness towards CURRIE. During the last year, however, LEWINSKY expressed frustration in CURRIE, as CURRIE became more reluctant to let the LEWINSKY meet with CLINTON.

LEWINSKY advised she usually had physical contact with CLINTON on weekends and at night during the week. LEWINSKY advised that BETTY CURRIE would call LEWINSKY to arrange LEWINSKY's meetings with CLINTON. LEWINSKY never mentioned if CURRIE knew about the physical relationship between CLINTON and LEWINSKY.

LEWINSKY mentioned NELL and UNGVARI thinks NELL worked in the White House cafeteria. NELL would give LEWINSKY M&M'S. LEWINSKY did not mention if she had a sexual relationship with NELL. LEWINSKY never mentioned if NELL knew about LEWINSKY's physical relationship with CLINTON.

LEWINSKY received psychiatric therapy, beginning her first year of college. LEWINSKY's therapist is IRENE KASORLA in Los Angeles. When LEWINSKY moved to Washington, DC, she

In March of 1996, LEWINSKY paid for UNGVARI to fly to Washington, DC. UNGVARI stayed with LEWINSKY and MARCIA LEWIS. UNGVARI visited LEWINSKY at the White House on the Friday of this visit. UNGVARI met a lot of LEWINSKY's co-workers, including BETTY CURRIE, ASHLEY RAINES, and NELL. UNGVARI went on a tour of the White House. Sometime later, LEWINSKY asked UNGVARI about the tour and indicated the room off to the right of the Oval Office is where LEWINSKY and CLINTON would engage in oral sex.

On the Sunday of this same weekend, LEWINSKY took UNGVARI to the White House to gather something LEWINSKY had left on her desk. During this visit, UNGVARI met some more people, including some Secret Service officers. UNGVARI recalls HILLARY and CHELSEA CLINTON going to the White House theater to watch a movie, but UNGVARI was looking the other way when they passed, so she missed them.

UNGVARI advised that she was waiting in a hallway for LEWINSKY when she overheard LEWINSKY talking to someone. At that time, CLINTON was exiting a restroom. LEWINSKY introduced UNGVARI as her friend from California. CLINTON said that he had heard about UNGVARI and mentioned something about UNGVARI being from Los Angeles or San Francisco. CLINTON mentioned that he was recently in San Francisco and that he had laryngitis. UNGVARI and LEWINSKY were excited about meeting CLINTON.

UNGVARI advised she felt like CLINTON was "checking her out." CLINTON was staring at UNGVARI's chest the entire time he was talking to UNGVARI. UNGVARI later told LEWINSKY of her impression, but LEWINSKY did not respond.

LEWINSKY told UNGVARI that her position at the White House was being eliminated and she was being transferred. LEWINSKY thought other women at the White House did not like her. LEWINSKY's contact with CLINTON was less frequent when LEWINSKY moved to the Pentagon.

LEWINSKY played an audio tape of a message CLINTON left on LEWINSKY's answering machine. CLINTON was not whispering in the call, but his voice was lowered. UNGVARI recognized CLINTON's voice. The message was something to the effect of "hi,

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I guess you're not home, good-bye.

LEWINSKY's contact with CLINTON was less frequent after she left employ at the White House. CLINTON tried to end the relationship on more than one occasion. LEWINSKY said that on one occasion, she began crying after CLINTON told her the relationship was going to end. CLINTON told LEWINSKY that he loved his family, so he could not continue the relationship.

On some occasions, CLINTON would call LEWINSKY after midnight. CLINTON wanted LEWINSKY to talk "dirty" to him. LEWINSKY could hear CLINTON masturbating as she talked. UNGVARI believes LEWINSKY and CLINTON engaged in phone-sex about five times.

LEWINSKY bought CLINTON at least two ties. CLINTON wore one tie while he signed the Telecom Bill. LEWINSKY gave UNGVARI a picture of CLINTON wearing a tie LEWINSKY had given him. LEWINSKY also bought CLINTON an antique. CLINTON gave LEWINSKY a broach, a hat pin, and a cigar in plastic wrapping.

LEWINSKY referred to CLINTON as "the Creep", "the Big Creep, " "the Big He, " and "him."

In October of 1997, LEWINSKY mentioned moving to New LEWINKSY did not want anything to do with politics. LEWINSKY mentioned meeting BILL RICHARDSON in her apartment at the Watergate. RICHARDSON offered LEWINSKY a job, but she did not want to work in that part of New York, nor did she want to work in politics. LEWINSKY never mentioned VERNON JORDAN's name to UNGVARI.

LEWINSKY spent Thanksgiving of 1997 in Los Angeles. UNGVARI met with LEWINSKY during a part of that holiday. LEWINSKY talked about New York.

UNGVARI spoke with LEWINSKY once in December of 1997. LEWINSKY mentioned moving to New York. LEWINSKY seemed depressed.

LEWINSKY called UNGVARI on January 2, 1998. UNGVARI had a guest at her house, so the conversation with LEWINSKY was not a long one. LEWINSKY seemed happy. The discussion focused

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After the story broke in January, UNGVARI left a message with LEWINSKY's father expressing her love for MONICA LEWINSKY. LEWINSKY's father did not know about the sexual relationship between LEWINSKY and CLINTON.

The day BILL GINSBURG was on numerous television talk shows, GINSBURG called UNGVARI and left a message on her answering machine. GINSBURG's message was that he hoped he had NATALIE UNGVARI's phone and he left his pager number for her to page him. UNGVARI did not page him. The messages before and after GINSBURG's were from reporters advising UNGVARI that GINSBURG had given her the "green light" to talk with them.

UNGVARI did not want to speak to the media as she did not want the attention and she did not have anything to say that would make LEWINSKY look better.



4 D.C., there were phone sessions; is that correct?

5 A Mm-hmm. But I know it also wasn't as regular when

6 she moved away. It was when she needed her, she would call.

7 Q Okay.

8 A Where before there were scheduled appointments.

9 Q Do you have any general remembrances or impressions

10 about the significance of this therapist on her life?

1 A I know that she told me what her therapist said,

12 and I - I remember thinking she was nuts and not agreeing

12 and 1 - 1 remember unliking size was not and not agree

Q The therapist?

15 A Yeah.

16 Q What did she say the therapist said?

17 A Well, I know that she had written some books. I

18 didn't read them, and I don't know what they're called, but I

19 know that they were about sex, and they were made for women,

20 I think.

23 not cheap.

I know that she is famous and that she sees
celebrities, people who are important. I know that she was

24 Q What was her name?

25 A Irene Kasorla, Dr. Irene Kasorla.

Q And when you said that you thought she was nuts,

- 2 the therapist was nuts, based on what? And, I take it, you
- 3 don't mean that in a technical sense necessarily.
- A No.
- Q Okay. Based on what Monica had told you she said,
- 6 was this based on things Monica told you she generally -- she
- 7 said, in general, the therapist, or advice that she would
- 8 give to Monica, or both?
- A Well, it was my opinion, based on what Monica said.
- 10 Monica didn't think she was --
- Q I understand it's your opinion, but is it based on,
- 12 in other words, things like, "Well, my therapist, based on
- 13 her books, thinks this about, for instance, relationships"?
- 14 Or was it, "My therapist said I should do this"?
- 15 In other words, was it based on the personal advice
- 16 the therapist gave to Monica that you thought the therapist
- 17 was nuts or --
- A I don't -- I don't think she gave her advice. I
- 19 think she analyzed actions she -- after Monica did whatever
- 20 she did.
- Q Okay, well, then analysis. In other words, would 21
- 22 she --
- 23 A Sometimes she reprimanded her and sometimes she
- 24 encouraged her. But, to me, whatever Monica was doing,
- 25 obviously, to me, it wasn't healthy, and I felt that her

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- 1 therapist wasn't helping the situation.
- Q Okay. In other words, her therapist did not -- she

Her therapist did not disapprove, apparently, of

- 3 told you what she told her therapist, for instance, about --
- 4 well, let's strike that.
- 6 some of her relationships or some of her actions as much as
- 7 maybe you did or some other friends?
- A I'm sure with some of them she disapproved. I
- 9 remember Monica being frustrated, the same way she would get
- 10 frustrated with me or other girlfriends. She felt like she
- 11 was being lectured at, and I think that she reacted that way
- 12 to her therapist, too.
- 13 It just didn't -- whatever they were doing, it
- 14 wasn't helping. Nothing ever changed it. It may have been
- 15 Monica's not wanting to make the effort, but it just -- to
- 16 me, her focus was sex and her --
- 17 Q Whose focus?
- A The focus of this therapist --18
- 19 Q Okay.
- A was sex and self-esteem, and I don't know if 20
- 21 that's what created this connection in Monica's head of sex
- 22 and self-esteem, or she encouraged it, or if she looked for a
- 23 specific therapist who specialized in it. I don't really
- 24 know. But it just seemed to be the practice to -- if it
- 25 would make you feel better, do it.

- o Okay.
- A As I remember it. I just remember thinking it was 3 silly.
- Q All right. The first thing, though, that I want to
- 5 try to get at is, your kind of somewhat negative assessment
- 6 of the therapist/counselor, I take it, was based on both
- 7 specific things that she told Monica about Monica as well as
- 8 just the general theories of this therapist?
 - A I don't understand.
- Q Okay. In other words, what I'm trying to get at --
- 11 not very well -- it seems that some of your negative attitude
- 12 towards the therapist -- I'll break it down -- was based upon
- 13 what Monica is telling you the therapist is telling Monica
- 14 about her --
- 15 A Yeah, yes.
- 16 Q All right. I just won't go any further than that.
- 17 Did Monica tell you that she told the therapist
- 18 about the relationship with Andy?
- 19 A Yes.
- 20 Q Okay. And did Monica tell you that she had told
- 21 the therapist about the relationship with the President?
- 22 A I don't think so.
- 23 MS. WIRTH: Can I ask something?
- 24 MR. WISENBERG: Yes.
 - MS. WIRTH: You don't think she told you that, or
- - 1 you don't think that --
 - THE WITNESS: I don't think she told me that,
 - BY MR. WISENBERG:
 - Q If you could describe for us, based on your
 - 5 knowledge, not only what you've seen of it, but what Monica
 - 6 has told you and how she has acted, if you would describe for
 - us the relationship of Monica Lewinsky with her mother.
 - A Oh, I know they're very close. They both like to
 - 9 shop. They both like the theater. I know that they they
 - 10 have a lot of similar interests, and so they're each other's
 - 11 companion when they go out.
 - 12 They've always lived together, except for the two
 - 13 years Monica was in Portland. And from what I knew, she
 - 14 shared a lot with her mom.
 - Q They confided in each other a lot?
 - 16
 - 17 Q She was closer with her mother than her father?
 - 18 A Definitely.
 - Q Any particular reason when this thing broke that
 - 20 you called the father, or tried to contact the father as
 - 21 opposed to the mother?
 - A Yeah, there were a couple reasons. He was closer.
 - 23 I had his number.
 - 24 Q Closer physically to you.
 - A Yeah.

- Q Geographically. 1
- 2 A Geographically, yes. And I had his number for when
- 3 Monica stays there when she's in town, and I didn't have her
- 4 mother's phone number.
- And the last contact I had had with her was just
- 6 this past Thanksgiving, and I think I had called January --7 the day that this came out, in mid-January, the 21st, I
- 8 think, I called, and the last time I had seen Monica was at
- 9 his house. We had had dinner and --
- 10 I'm very comfortable with her dad and her stepmom,
- 11 and when she's -- they've invited me over while she's not in
- 12 town. They make an effort to have a relationship with me
- 13 also, her stepmother and father, and it just seemed
- 14 appropriate to call.
- O No special reason or other. 15
- A No. 16
- Q You have mentioned that some of the reporters, or 17 17
- 18 at least one reporter told you that Ginsburg had given you
- 19 the green light to talk to them; is that correct?
- 20 A Yes.
- 21 Q Did you ever confirm, directly or indirectly,
- 22 whether or not that was true?
- A No. I didn't care. I didn't want to tell her.
- Q Did you know Ginsburg personally? 24
- 25 A No.

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- Q Any particular reason you didn't contact him?
- 2 Because you also said that he had left a message, correct?
- A Yes. 3
- O Ginsburg.
- A I didn't contact him for the same reasons I didn't
- 6 contact any of the media. I just felt that I had nothing to
- 7 say that would make it better, and I had nothing -- I felt
- 8 that any attempt I would make to say something positive about
- 9 her would just be manipulated anyway, and I didn't want any
- 10 media attention. I had just started a job. And I didn't
- 11 want to invite any more involvement than I already had.
- Q I take it, Ginsburg's message to you was completely 13 nonsubstantive, it was just, "Get in touch with me"?
- 14 A Yeah.
- 15 Q He gave no hint of why.
- A Nothing. 16
- 17 Q Okay. You mentioned that you -- correct me if I've
- 18 got this wrong. I think you mentioned that you had asked
- 19 Monica whether or not Betty Currie knew about the
- 20 relationship and Monica said no; is that correct?
- 21 A Yes.
- Q Do you remember when, in terms of the beginning, 22
- 23 middle, end of the relationship, this conversation would have
- 24 happened?
- A I think in the middle.

Q Did Monica ever say or do anything to make you

- 2 think that that had changed, Betty's knowledge or lack
- 3 thereof?
- A No.
- Q What did she tell you about the nature of her 5
- 6 relationship with Betty Currie?
- A I know that they were friends. I know that there
- 8 were times when she would go to the office to see Betty, to
- 9 visit.
- 10 Q In other words, just to visit Betty, not just to -11 not just as a prelude to seeing the President?
- A Yes. I know she was fond of Betty.
- 13 Q Did - I'm sorry, I didn't realize you were still -
- 14 -
- 15 A I'm trying to remember more what I knew about
- 16 Betty. That's it.
- Q Did Monica ever express any fear to you, concern
- 18 ever about somebody finding out about the relationship?
- 19 A No.
- 20 Q And you might have answered this before the break,
- 21 but on the well, pardon me just a minute, and I'll find
- 22 out if you were asked.
- 23 (Mr. Wisenberg conferred with Ms. Wirth.)
- 24 BY MS. WIRTH:
- 25 Q Pardon me for that diversion.

- I think there was some testimony to the effect that 2 the President - Monica told you the President was trying to
- 3 disengage from the relationship at some point in time. Do
- 4 you recall that?
- A I know it happened more than once.
- Q Okay. Did she ever say that he gave a reason for 7 that?
- A I can't remember I know that at least once he
- 9 said that he loved his family. I know it happened more than
- 10 once. Not that he necessarily gave that reason, but I know
- 11 he tried to end it more than once.
- There may have been a time during the reelection,
- 13 but I don't know if -- I remember Monica saying something
- 14 about -- that there was nothing during the reelection. I
- 15 don't know if it was because she was told there will be
- 16 nothing during the reelection, or she assumed that that's
- 17 why, and it was a convenient excuse for nothing going on
- 18 then.
- 19 Q Do you recall Monica getting very disappointed
- 20 because she thought she'd be able to come back right after
- 21 the election and it didn't happen, around November, December,
- 22 say, of '96?
- A I remember her being disappointed for that reason. 23 24 I don't remember when in relation to the election.
- MR. WISENBERG: Do you have some?

BY MS. WIRTH: 1

2 Q Just a few questions that we didn't cover earlier.

Did Monica ever tell you about any phone calls that 3

4 she received from the President while she was at home?

A Yes.

O When did those phone calls occur, generally? 6

A Always in the middle of the night. 7

O After midnight? 8

A Yes, usually. 9

O Would Monica be asleep sometimes? 10

A Sometimes. 11

O And would be the nature of those phone calls? 12

A Sometimes he wanted to talk and sometimes he wanted 13 14 phone sex.

O And she tell you anything about specifically what 15 16 happened during those calls?

A She said that the ones that were sexual, she said 17 18 that he would ask her to talk while he masturbated.

MR. WISENBERG: Questions? 19

A JUROR: Do you know whether at any point in time 20

21 that Monica's mom was seeing the same therapist?

THE WITNESS: Was seeing the same therapist? 22

23 A JUROR: Yes.

THE WITNESS: I don't know anything about that. 24

MR. WISENBERG: All right. If there are no --

A JUROR: I have a question. You talked about

2 there was someone in high school and how Monica would make

3 sure she befriended the mother and the family, and you also

4 talked about Andy and how she befriended his wife and his

5 kids.

25

Would you say that this was some form of

7 manipulation in order that she knew where they were and how

8 to be around them, and she could be in touch with the closest

9 people to these people in order to be around them?

Like if she was invited to the family functions or 10

11 she wanted to get in close with the mother and the family to 12 be around this person?

THE WITNESS: I don't know why she did it. I 13

14 remember always thinking it was sick. Because it just -- it

15 never made anything better for her. It made her more

16 depressed, more emotionally involved, that it -- it just

17 didn't make it better.

I don't know if she had an agenda. I don't know --18

19 I know that she genuinely cared for these people, and

20 whatever she did to make a relationship with them, they

21 mutually did the same, so --

22 BY MR. WISENBERG:

Q Did she ever express any regret ever about 23

24 involvement with -- either involvement with people who were

25 married or, like in the case of Andy, involvement with

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1 somebody who was married and she's got a relationship with

2 the wife? Did she ever express any regret or kind of guilt

3 over that to you?

A No.

5 MR. WISENBERG: Yes, ma'am?

A JUROR: I just have one question. You had 6

7 mentioned that the President had tried to end the

8 relationship several times with Monica. Did she ever tell

9 you who revised the relationship again? Was it Monica or the

10 President?

11 THE WITNESS: I think it was Monica.

12 A JUROR: She initiated it?

THE WITNESS: Yes. And I don't know if it was 13

14 always him wanting to end the physical. I think, in addition

15 to ending the physical, I think he wanted the visits to stop,

16 too, and she would react the same way.

17 A JUROR: As far as you know, who did she get --

18 you said that she got close with the family of whoever she

19 was interested in. To the President, who was it she close

20 with while she was --

THE WITNESS: I think Betty. I don't know that she 21

22 had a relationship with his wife, the President's wife.

MR. WISENBERG: Going once, going twice. Speak now 23

24 or forever hold your peace.

(No response.)

MR. WISENBERG: All right. Thank you very much.

2 Sometimes people come to the grand jury, and no matter how

3 long they're here, it's human nature that you'll remember

4 something when you're on the plane going back home -

5 THE WITNESS: Mm-hmm.

6 MR. WISENBERG: That you just didn't think of. If

7 that happens, I would ask you to let your attorney know so

8 that he can let us know.

9 THE WITNESS: Okav.

MR. WISENBERG: And if there are no more questions,

11 may the witness be excused and go back home?

12 THE FOREPERSON: Yes, she may.

13 THE WITNESS: Thank you.

MR. WISENBERG: Thank you.

(The witness was excused.)

(Whereupon, at 12:34 p.m., the taking of the

17 testimony in the presence of a full quorum of the Grand Jury

18 was concluded.)

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
