## S. CON. RES. 13 (ORDER NO. 39)

*Ordered*, That at 10:00 a.m. on Tuesday, March 31, 2009, the Senate resume consideration of S. Con. Res. 13, an original concurrent resolution setting forth the congressional budget for the United States Government for fiscal year 2010, revising the appropriate budgetary levels for fiscal year 2009, and setting forth the appropriate budgetary levels for fiscal years 2011 through 2014; provided, that the Senator from Washington (Mrs. Murray) be recognized for 15 minutes; provided further, that following her remarks, the Senator from New Hampshire (Mr. Gregg) or his designee to offer an amendment, with one hour equally divided; followed by the Senator from California (Mrs. Boxer) to offer an amendment in relation to Amdt. No. 731 offered by the Senator from South Dakota (Mr. Thune), with one hour equally divided; followed by the Senator from North Dakota (Mr. Conrad) or his designee to offer a side-by-side amendment to Amdt. No. 735 offered by the Senator from Nebraska (Mr. Johanns.)

*Ordered further*, That when the Senate resumes consideration of S. Con. Res. 13 on Tuesday, March 31, 2009, the statutory time remaining be 40 hours, with each side controlling 20 hours; provided further, that for the duration of the debate, all time during quorum calls be charged equally to both sides. (*Mar. 30, 2009.*)
