This statewide project will focus on the health needs of residents in Benton, Franklin, Clark, Clallam, Jefferson, Cowlitz, Wahkiakum, Garfield, Asotin, Mason, Pierce, Snohomish, Spokane, Thurston, and Yakima Counties through the work of 12 VISTA Volunteers (including one VISTA Leader). The primary focus of this program is fall prevention for seniors. More than one third of adults 65 and older fall each year and of those who fall, 20% to 30% suffer moderate to severe injuries that make it hard to get around or live alone and increase the chance of early death. In addition, the average health care cost of a fall injury is \$19,440 (including hospital, nursing home, emergency room, and home health care, but not doctors' services) which can lead to incredible financial burden on low-income seniors. Based on these facts, VISTA members will work with volunteers to promote best practices when it comes to fall prevention.
