

a) Identify and describe the data sources used in determining the levels of State support for elementary and secondary education

The level of state support for elementary and secondary education was determined by using the sum of state funding for: (1) general equalization aid through the state's primary elementary and secondary education funding formula (unrestricted grants-in-aid), (2) categorical aids that partially fund specific school program costs such as special education, class size reduction, pupil transportation, and bilingual education (restricted grants-in-aid), (3) funding for the state's two public residential schools, the Wisconsin School for the Deaf and the Wisconsin Center for the Blind and Visually Impaired, and (4) school levy credits that provide state funding to offset school property taxes. The inclusion of these four categories of funding is consistent with the method the state uses in calculating the state share of funding for K-12 education.

For FY 2006, amounts appropriated in state statute for these four categories of aid were used to determine state support for elementary and secondary education and the maintenance of effort requirement. For FY 2009, FY 2010, and FY 2011, the amounts appropriated under the Governor's proposed 2009-11 biennial budget for these four funding categories were used to determine state support for elementary and secondary education.

b) Identify and describe the data sources used in determining the levels of State support for public IHEs

For FY 2006, amounts appropriated in state statute for the University of Wisconsin System and the Wisconsin Technical College System were used to determine state support public IHEs and the maintenance of effort requirement. Totals for fiscal years 2010 and 2011 were calculated using figures from the Governor's proposed 2009-11 biennial budget. General Purpose Revenue (GPR) and Segregated Revenue (SEG) were included in all totals.

2. State's Primary Education Funding Formulae

Additional Submission Requirement: In an attachment to the application, identify and describe each of the State's primary elementary and secondary education funding formulae that were used in determining the calculations provided above for the levels of State support for elementary and secondary education.

Wisconsin has one primary elementary and secondary education funding formula, the general equalization aid formula, which is used to distribute approximately 78% of all state support for the state's 426 school districts. The formula provides unrestricted aid to school districts and funds a broad range of school district operational expenditures and academic programs.

The equalization aid formula is a power equalization aid formula operating under the principle of requiring an equal school district property tax rate for equal per pupil expenditures. The rate at which school costs are aided through the formula is determined by comparing a school district's per pupil tax base (property value per pupil) to the state's guaranteed tax base. Equalization aid is provided in three tiers to make up the difference between the amount of revenue generated by each district's actual per pupil property tax base and the state's guaranteed tax base. Expenditures of districts with low per pupil property values are aided more highly through the equalization aid formula than expenditures of districts with high per pupil property values.

State support for elementary and secondary education in FY 2008 was determined using the amount appropriated under state statute for general equalization aid. State support for elementary and secondary education in FY 2009 and FY 2010 was determined using the amounts appropriated for general equalization aid under the Governor's proposed 2009-11 biennial budget, which was introduced for consideration by the Legislature on February 17, 2009.

3. Data on State Support for Postsecondary Education

The level of state support for public institutions was determined by totaling state appropriations allocated to the University of Wisconsin System and the Wisconsin Technical College System under biennial budget legislation in fiscal years 2008 and 2009. Totals for fiscal years 2010 and 2011 were calculated using figures from the Governor's proposed 2009-11 biennial budget. General Purpose Revenue (GPR) and Segregated Revenue (SEG) were included in all totals.
