# Claim of Officer or Soldier for Invalid Pension.

The State of Ohio, County of Scioto, ss.

On this twelfth day of August, A. D., 1864, personally appeared before (1) S. B. Drayton, Clerk of Scioto County Court of Common Pleas

a Court of Record within and for said county, Wallace E. Edwards, aged twenty three years, a resident of Wheelerburg, in the county of Scioto, and State of Ohio, who, being first duly sworn according to law, declares that he is the identical Wallace E. Edwards

who enlisted in the service of the United States, at La-Fayette, in the County of Hippocanon, and State of Indiana

on the 14<sup>th</sup> day of June, in the year 1861, as a private in Company D, commanded by Captain J. Templeton, in the 15<sup>th</sup> Regiment of Indiana

Volunteer Infantry, commanded by Col. G. D. Wagner, in the war of 1861, and was honorably discharged on the Eighth day of July, A. D. 1864 as will appear by his certificate of discharge herewith presented. (2)

That while in the service aforesaid, and in the line of his duty, (3) at the Battle of Stone River, State of Tennessee, on the 31<sup>st</sup> of December, A.D. 1862, he was struck by a minie ball in the left arm near the shoulder, causing longitudinal fracture of the left arm near the shoulder and partial destruction of the muscles surrounding the shoulder joint.

That since leaving the service he has resided at Wheelerburg, in the State of Ohio, and his occupation has been Farmer

He makes this declaration for the purpose of being placed on the Invalid Pension Roll of the United States, on account of the disability above stated

Sir:

I have the honor to return herewith your request for a report of hospital treatment in Claim, No. 256,229, with such information as is furnished by the records filed in this Office, viz: that Wm E. Edwards, Pvt., Co. "D", 15 Indiana Vols., was severely wounded in the shoulder, at the battle of Stone River, Tenn., Decr 29, 1862, to June 3, 1863. Wallace Edwards, said Co. and regt., was admitted to G.H. No. 1 Nashville, Tenn., Jan'y 12, 1863, with a GSW., and transferred April 22, 1863. Wallace E. Edwards, said Co. and regt., was admitted to G.H. No. 1 Louisville, Ky, April 23, 1863, with a gun shot fracture of left humerus, and transferred June 29, 1863. Admitted to G.H. No. 8 New Albany, Ind., June 29, 1863, with a GSW., and transferred July 24, 1863. Admitted to G.H. Madison, Ind., July 24, 1863, with a GSW. of left arm, fracture of humerus, upper third, and returned to duty, Decr 1, 1863.

There are no records of the regt on file.

description.

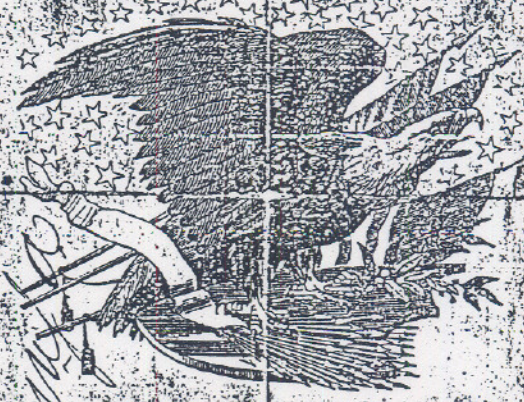
A more particular description of the applicant's condition

The ball entered about the fourth rib in front of the  
arm passed upward and outward making its exit  
about an inch below the head of the os humeri. The bone  
was fractured longitudinally. The Deltoid muscle is  
destroyed. An inability to raise the arm at the shoulder  
motion is good from the elbow down

Native, Forfarshire, N. B.  
Born Nov. 11, 1790, some-  
time a resident of W. Indies,  
South America and Canada.  
Then in succession a citizen  
of Mexico, Texas\* and U. S.  
By profession a Farmer,  
Teacher, Preacher and Histo-  
rian. In faith a Restorationist,  
in practice a philanthropist,  
and, in Mystic Tie, Temper-  
ance Son, and Odd Fellow.

Native, Cumberland, Pennsylvania;  
Born January 9th, 1801. Married in  
M'Daheysville, (Named from, & rear-  
ed up by her maternal Uncle, and  
father's influence) Virginia; July 29th,  
1819. Afterward continuing a rare  
example of Christian fortitude, Ma-  
ternal prudence and conjugal fidelity;  
during her husband's NINETEEN years  
absence in other lands. Re-united  
March 2d, 1839, in Wheelersburgh,  
Scioto County, Ohio.†

DIED *in Wheelersburg O. March 17 1870*

Paternal ancestors, Anglo-Saxon,  
Edred; who to preserve their Na-  
tional and Religious Liberty, retired  
to Wales, before William the Con-  
queror; And to Scotland from bloody  
Queen Mary! Finally, through the  
Cianship of Ailie, became perpetual  
Edward's of Clachbocatur's Ancestral  
Maternal, Barnett's of Girathmore;  
by marriage 1776, perpetual resident  
of Jamaica, Edward's Butterbourne,  
Seputichre Edentment; Dundee.

Man, solitary man—what else is he?

With the fairest of creation's mould.
