I take my pen in hand & write to you once more hoping these few lines will find you quite well and in good spirits for that is the way it leave me at present but I have been about sick for several weeks but I am better now it is a long time since I wrote to you but I hope you will forgive me for we have had a hard march and 2 days of hard fighting front of Nashville, which you have heard about it before now and I was in it all the 2 day but I was as lucky as before come out without a scratch and we are now at Huntsville Ala and we have built winter quarters by order of our Gen and we have just <sup>AGO</sup> got them done and we are all right if they will let us stay in them as long as they say. 3 months it is a nice place and it puts me in mind of spring this morning <sup>THE?</sup> meadow larks is ringing and the blue birds but I suppose it is pretty cold there now but we have had some cold wether down here we expect to be paid before we leave here and I hope we will for there is an 4 years pay dew to me now about \$ 400 dol and that will be quite a pile but I would like to have got it before now that it ~~would~~ do you some good for I know

that you have needed it but I could not get it  
but I hope that I can get it soon

I received a letter from George about 2  
weeks ago and he was quite well and I shall  
write to him today and I have not had a letter  
from Louisa for some time but they was all  
well then and I am a going to write to them  
today and Elizabeth the same and John but  
I hope they are all well and Mary Ann and  
you and the old Gentleman and and my best

Dear mother I have got a chance to write to you once more I suppose that you think that I have forgot you but I have not for we have had a very long march we have marched over 200 miles since I wrote <sup>to</sup> you and we had know chance to write I wrote a letter to you while we was on the march but I lose it we arived in Cape Gerods <sup>[GIRAZDEA, MD]</sup> on the <sup>[MISSISSIPPI]</sup> river there on the 21 and I received a letter there from you and I was very glad to hear from you and to hear that you got that money when I received the other letter I thought that you had not got the money because the letter you answered a wrote only 2 days before and that was the letter that Elizabeth wrote and I answered it I cant tell weather I shall have a chance to write to you again for we are on the Tenessee River and is bound for the pitsburge landing at corinth and they say that they started a fighting this morning and it will take us about 2 days longer before we get there but dont fret about me for fear that I will be killed for I dont expect to be killed there for I think that it will be over before we get there and if not I dont think that I shall be killed so now dont fret for I think that this battel will ~~be~~ settel it and then I shall soon be home and I dont care how soon for this life / his a very hard one and the soner it his over the better for it

his the ruination of any young man the way we  
have marched around but I think that now we have  
got on the river we will have so much hard marching  
and I think that this battle will shurley whinde  
it up I have <sup>I AM</sup> <sup>SERIOUS</sup> to think that we have got to  
go from our devison after we have run around all  
over Missouri and <sup>ARKANSAS</sup> and we have drive the  
enemies from our devison but still if we are needed  
I ham willing to go and do what I can and I  
hope and to the Lord that he will take me through  
the battle safe and I hope that I may get safe  
home again I had a dream last night and I  
dreampt that we was marching through the town  
and I ask aman what the name of this town  
and they told me that it was Rockford and afer  
we camped I went down town and then I come  
home and I seen you all and I thought that  
we had to leave the next morning and I  
hated to leave but I thought that I bid you all  
good by and left with good spirits I ham quite  
well and in good spirit and I hope that you are  
the same and all the rest I will waite to  
clothes my writing now we are now a going up  
the Pon esee river and we think that it will  
take 2 days before we get to Pittsburg landing  
and I hope that I can be able to get  
home again now dear mother dont fret about  
me for I han'te afaraid that I shall be

and all other dutys and there his know signs  
of any moor fighting for us here once in a  
while they charge on our fouriging trains with  
there cavelry and burn some wagons but it  
his only some of there gorils I whill have  
to bring my letter to a close I have wrote a  
letter to George and one to Louisa but I dont  
know hardley weather she whill get it for I  
dont know how to direct but I whill risk one  
I am quite whell and in good spirits and I

I take my pen in hand to write to you once more hoping these few lines will find you quite well and in good spirits for that is the way it leaves me quite well we have a very good time now we have got in camp it seems like getting home to get in to camp once more after being on the move so long I received a letter a few days ago from Louisa and they was all well and she said that George had inlisted and I would like to know what Rigt. if you know tell me in the first letter you write if you please I hope if he has inlisted that he will have as good luck has I have had in the great battles but I hope he has not inlisted for over one year and I hope he has took my advice about inlisting if he has he will have a better time than I have had if he has inlisted in the Army or heavy-artillery for that is so much eayser time than I have had but I think that the war will soon be over after election I hope so anyway for it is time the news his here that they are a trashing the rebels very bad in Via, Gen Sheridan his trashing them very bad and I am very glad of that

we gained a very great victory over them when we took Atlanta from them for it is one of their best holds there is 3 railroads runs in to it and so you can tell that it is an important place for them and they had large arsenals there and factories and other important things that made it a very important place but they had to get out of it and I think that it made know diferance who gets elected they will soon be peace if Lincon or Mr D. gets it peace will soon be made but the quicker it is done the beter it will suit me, if I had not inlisted again I would been on my road home now but if peace is made I will not be sorry for it for I can make more than I could home but still I should like to have come home with them for I wanted to inlist after I got home I could get as much bounty for one year as I get now for 3 but I hope and trust that it is all for the better and I hope and trust that I shall be permitted to return home to see you once more and that George may do the same Dear Mother I hope these few lines will find you and the Old Gentlemen both quite well and in good

I take the pen in my hand to write you a few lines hoping they will find you quite well and in good spirit and good health and all the rest I am in the hospital yet but I am almost well I have some pain in my side yet when I cross the ridge it is they say in \_\_\_\_\_ about 10 miles beyond Springfield and they are after Price and Sergal and Jim Lane is trying to get around him Sergal is on one side of him and Jim Lane is on the other side and they have got a good deal of train of provisions and they have got a good lot of men prisoners and I heard that they have taken 10 or 12 of his guns and I am in hopes they will catch him but he such a coward that he runs so fast that he makes our men travel faster than they have been used to marching but I think they will catch him before they leave him he was in Springfield when they first started toward him and they got within about 10 miles and he heard that we was a coming and he hid off in the night and 2 or 3000 bushels of corn and wheat he could take it away with him and

that helpt us very much I would like to have went with them but I could not go and so they have got so far that I dont think that I shant see the ridgement again for some time for they have got so far that if i was able to start now it would take one some time before I could catch up with them but I shant leave the outfit until I get quite well and able to stand to march I wish that this war business was wound up and I could get home again I heard that they have had some harde battels in Kentucky and they have gained some good victrys and I wish that they could gain more I think that a few such battels would soon wind up the south and I dont care how soon they do it for I ham a getting ~~sueh~~ sick of this cind of a life I supose that Louisa is now and I would like to be there to see her but I cant be there but if she is home I give my respects to her and I hope she is well and in good spirit I ournt think of much more to say now but I hope that these few lines will find you all well we got paid off the other day and I would like to send you 10 dol but we are in such a wildness that I hate to resks it I cant think of much

more to say now but give my respects  
to all inquiring friends
