1862

Oct 15th into his works, in great haste. My then fell sick and rested for the night.

The enemy surrendered at day light the morning. We were among the first in town the victory was complete and captured 160000 provisions and one hundred pieces of artillery, and several thousand commensary stores.

Our regiment received marching orders to depart at 6 o'clock morning on the 17th. Distance 18 miles we reached it late in the evening pitched camp.

Left the landing above Ft Henry for upper Tennessee.

Passed Blount a little town on the east bank of the Tennessee.

13th

Landed near Savannah where we caught up with us who show above.

15th

Moved up to Pittsburg Landing 8 miles above Savannah.

1862.

March 16th

Left the tent this morning
Regiment ordered on picket.

17th

All quiet last night nothing
occurred to disturb our
peace night's rest in position
of camp. Picked our tent
and went into camp about
one mile from the river

April 4th

Our pickets were attacked
about 4 o'clock P.M. at first
fighting ensued the enemy
were repulsed with consider-
able loss.

" 6th

The enemy attacked our
position last 4 P.M. drove
us the pickets back
fighting all day. We were
driven to within a half
mile of the landing. Gen
Smith ordered the company
into the enemy is checked.

7th

Fighting continued all day with
great loss on both sides.

During the morning
we observed the
enemy slowly at 2 P.M. they
held a short retreat but
returning to the desperate condition
of the battle we cannot
describe them. The great
loss in the night of all the
time past the loss was
embodied light to reflect

killed 22 wounded 100. Loss

one has since died.

4th Moved camp 3 miles and a half west camp beyond Camanche. Pitched tents in Grimshaw's Co. Mississippis.

5th Division made a reconnaissance one mile in the direction of Camanche remained until 10th and returned to

9th Camp moved lower up. Getting to our left Division moved under arms westward by a line of march 2 miles S.E. in the direction of the firing ground. our orders on the morning were, marched 5 miles back. but the direct road to Camanche, return via old position as the one we held the night before.

 and advanced in line of battle
 to Beeryville held all four to
 the morning and camp thick position
 Beeryville for the night we were
 there.

 a few miles from Beeryville
 drove them before us all day
 camped near Danville. 31st 1st
 a few miles from Beeryville

Rested all day in camp all day. Genl's advance reached Danville 12pm

12th

Left camp near Danville marched in direction of camp Proctor Johnson's units turned and marched back to Stevingsburg. Danville Pike. Genl the Rebels and went to Danville reached town a midnight 9:45 pm

Relieved from Picket and returned to camp 2 miles north of town

14th

Left camp at 6 A.M. rolled over town and then returned to camp at 10 pm on road to Stevingsburg and got supper in camp again in the Oak Orchard road during the evening. Pickets before noon. Rolled just before day.

Moved again at Sun River passed through Oak Orchard during the evening early before us 2nd light moved to the left, marched 4 miles across to the road leading from Mt. Vernon. In Hancock in hopes of cutting off the enemy, we had had no success on the P. road but they had all passed before we could show. Marched the road went into camp.

16th

Moved at day light marched 9 miles and came to 4 miles Mt. Vernon & Oak Orchard, went 2 miles from the former, passed through Mt. Vernon at 4:30 pm, camped for the night 9 miles beyond near Rockcastle River

17th

Moved at 8 A.M. crossed Rockcastle River and commenced column along with it mountain reached camp. Did not get at 9 P.M. Went into camp in the same spot that was occupied by Genl. Stone

great Regiment on a scout to London & Richmond Road moved from Camp 17th Oct 1862 and proceeded to a short distance found the road blocked and with fallen timber cleared them out. Captured the coverings and loads. moved our cartridges with 20th Reg. changed as Administrators 1st & 2nd Regs. and leaving them 31st Oct & 20th Ohio as residue.

Came up with and captured by night at the entry of Sun spot, at the same place captured several prisoners, and a lot of leaf cattle, camped on the field. With out two blankets blankets in great good some part of the 10th Ohio

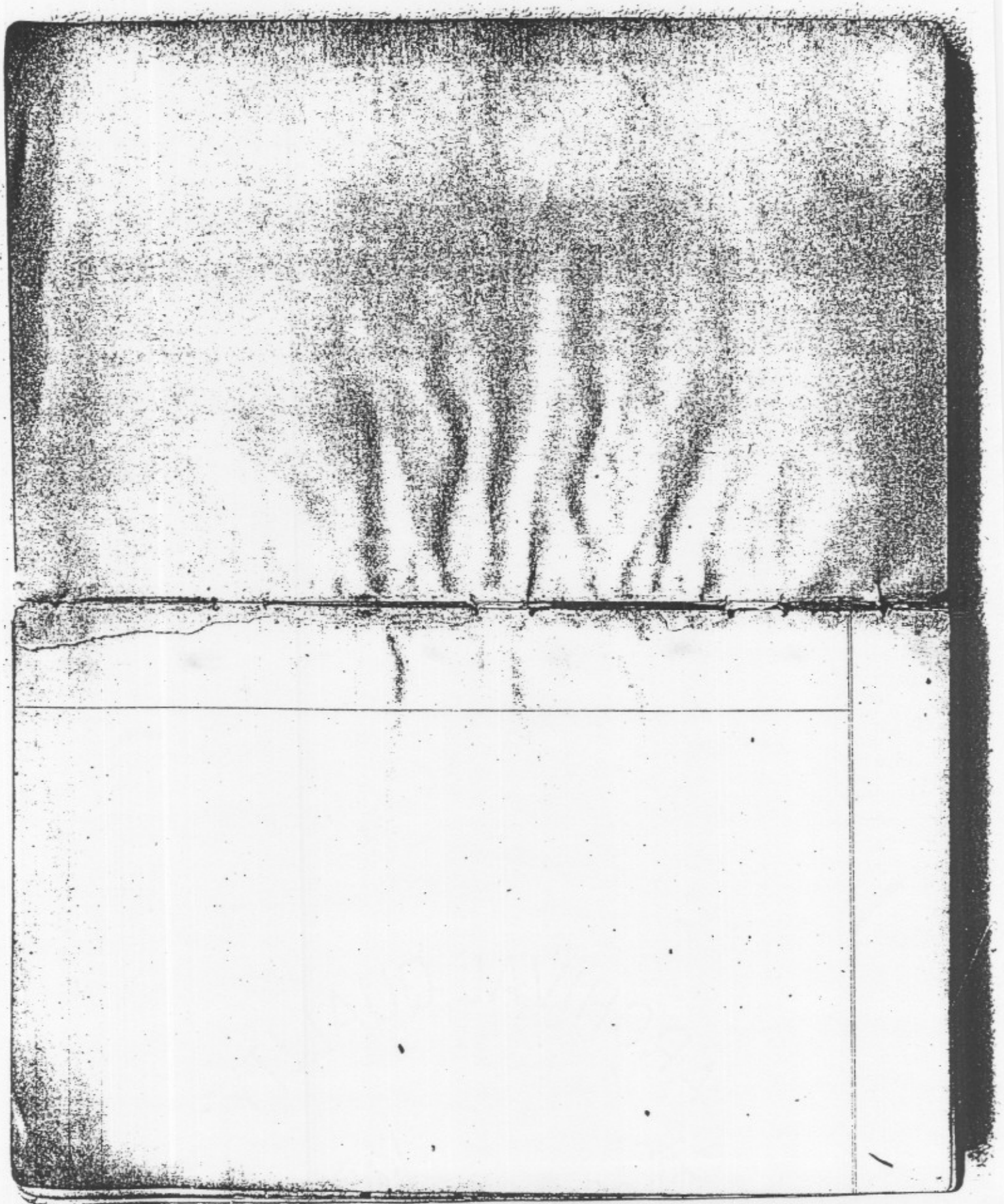
