ROUTE OF REBELS IN WESTERN KENTUCKY AND TENNESSEE.

The Advance of Gen. Rosecrans' Army Upon Murfreesboro'—Rebels Driven Back at All Points—The Rebels in Force at Newbern's Creek—The Armies in Line of Battle Facing Each Other.

LAWRENCE, Tenn., Dec. 12, via Louisville, Ky.—Orders to advance on the enemy were given Christmas Eve, but were countermanded before daylight. On the morning of the 13th our entire force was in motion, sweeping down the Wilson, No. Kanawha and Murfreesboro' River.

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DEATH OF MAJOR ROSENKRANTZ.—Major ADOLPH ROSENKRANTZ, of the Anderson Cavalry who was killed at the late battle near Murfreesboro' was a young officer extensively known in this city. He was the son of George D. Rosengarten and younger brother of Lieutenant Joseph G. Rosengarten. He was connected, at one time, with the Commonwealth Artillery Company, afterwards with that commanded by Colonel CHAPMAN BRIBBLE, and finally with the Anderson Troop, which he joined in the summer of 1861, and of which he was made Orderly Sergeant previous to the Troop leaving Carlisle Barracks. The Troop being ordered West, and having made themselves useful as the body guard of Gen. BULL, young Rosengarten was promoted as Second Lieutenant of a regiment of Kentucky cavalry, and assigned to duty with his old company, of which he was for a time commander, and when the company increased to a regiment the young Lieutenant was made its Senior Major, and at the battle near Murfreesboro' he commanded the regiment. He was but twenty-four years of age at the time of his death, and was respected and loved for his kindness of heart, and admired for his firmness and valor.

FUNERAL OF MAJOR ROSENKRANTZ.—The funeral of Major ADOLPH G. ROSENKRANTZ, of the Anderson Troop, who fell while gallantly fighting in the action near Murfreesboro', in which a portion of the Anderson Cavalry was engaged, will take place this morning, at 10 o'clock, from the residence of his father, No. 1632 Chestnut street. Two companies of the Second Regiment Infantry, and two companies, A and C, of the First Artillery, Philadelphia Home Guard, will parade on the occasion. The military escort will be under the command of Major Lewis A. Scott, of the Second Infantry. Major ROSENKRANTZ was formerly a Sergeant in the artillery Regiment belonging to the Home Guard.
