

Camp 22 Regement of indiana Vols Miss Margret Clark, it is with a heavy harte that I seate my self to write you a few lines Consurning your brother John. He was with me all the time since he left home. Him and (me) messed together and slep together all the time and when he was sick I took the best care of him that I Could. He had gained his strength just before the harde battle of Murfreeboro was faught and we marched together all the time. In fact we was just Like brothers. was a good soldier and the boys all morne the loss of him. We slep together the night before the battle on sum seader bushes that we gathered to ceap us oute of the mud. We was not allowed any fire at all and we had no blankets. They was left behinde with the wagons and it was very Cold that night and we Could not Sleepe hardly any and he told me that if he got killed he wanted me to write to you. I told him that I would, and this was the first Chanse. He was shot threw the hips and was taken prisner. They took him and another man from our Compainey together. The other man Came to the Regement last Sunday and he said that John Dyed the next day after he was wounded. He said that they took good Care of him and when he died that they buried him in a walnut Coffin in the grave yarde and marked his grave so that it Could be found. I was at his side when he fell, but the Rebels came on us so fast that we Could not take him off the field. He was wonded in a Cornfield. We was marched out. Their 4 Regements of us and their was 20 thousand Came on us and 2 batteries and we was Cut to peases very mutsh. We lost 18 killed wonded and missing out

of our Compainey. I was nocked down with a peace of shell that hit me in the side but I soone got over that. Well I must Close hoping that this may finde you all well. He was wonded the day before new years and buried new years Eavening. Fare well For the present. Write and Lett me know how you are geting along.


