Key Areas for Integration

- Family Planning and prevention of mother to child transmission
 - Family Planning counseling and services linked to Voluntary Counseling and Testing
 - Provision of Family Planning in Care and Treatment Programs
 - Integrated Youth prevention services
 - Development of innovative contraceptive technology, such as microbicides

Family planning can help prevent HIV transmission by:

- reducing HIV infections among infants
- decreasing child and maternal mortality
- decreasing the number of orphans (HIV children born to HIV+ moms)
- contributing to improved overall health status

These benefits enable both HIV-positive and HIV-negative individuals to make the best choices for their optimal health. A USAID-funded analysis of the costs and benefits of adding family planning to PMTCT programs suggests that this approach could save the lives of thousands of women and children — it is unethical not to do so.
