## SUBJECT: Winning the Fight for Wounded Veterans – Airmen Supporting Service-Disabled Veteran-Owned Small Businesses

As disabled soldiers, sailors, marines and airmen return from war, we must create opportunities for these courageous warriors who selflessly served to protect our nation and guarantee our freedom. Today, there are over 9,800 firms led by service-disabled veterans doing business for the government, and many more of these small businesses will be established over the next several years. Not only do these veterans understand the mission, they can bring experience, innovation, responsiveness, agility and efficiency to the fight in air, space and cyberspace. Also, they are likely to hire, mentor and train other war veterans in need of assistance in transitioning to productive private life.

Your small business specialist and the Air Force Office of Small Business Programs (SAF/SB) are there to help you identify strategies and capable firms, and to track our progress toward meeting the 3% Service-Disabled Veteran-Owned Businesses goal.

There is no greater opportunity to demonstrate this fundamental belief than through the support of the Air Force mission and priorities by making opportunities available to our Service-Disabled Veteran-Owned Businesses.
